



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Judith and Patrick Casey

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Judith and Patrick Casey, the appellants, by attorney Patrick J. Cullerton, of Thompson Coburn LLP in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds no change in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$24,641
IMPR: \$128,772
TOTAL: \$153,413

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

ANALYSIS

The subject property is improved with a 2-story dwelling of masonry construction containing 2,512 square feet of living area. The dwelling is 128 years old. Features of the home include a full, unfinished basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 2-car garage.

The appellants' appeal is based on unequal treatment in the assessment process. The appellants submitted information on seven comparable properties described as 2-story masonry or frame dwellings that range in age from 111 to 128 years old. The comparable dwellings range in size from 2,410 to 2,600 square feet of living area. All comparables feature full basements, two of which are finished. Three comparables have central air conditioning, three have 1 or 2 fireplaces and three have 1, 2 or 2½-car garages. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$31.02 to \$35.81 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment is \$51.26 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment was disclosed.

The board of review presented descriptions and assessment information on four comparable properties consisting of 2 or 3-story masonry or frame and masonry dwellings that range in age from 2 to 126 years old. The dwellings range in size from 2,304 to 3,880 square feet of living area. Three comparables feature full basements, two of which are finished, and one has a slab foundation. All four have central air conditioning. Three have fireplaces and three have 2 or 2½-car garages. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$51.75 to \$58.96 per square foot of living area. In support of their assessment, the board of review also disclosed that the subject was purchased in March, 2005 for \$1,525,000; comparable #1 was purchased in June, 2006 for \$1,660,000; comparable #2 was purchased in May, 2005 for \$1,875,000; comparable #3 was purchased in April, 2003 for \$1,820,000; and comparable #4 was purchased in July, 2006 for \$2,200,000. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal. The Board further finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The appellants contend unequal treatment in the subject's improvement assessment as the basis of the appeal. Taxpayers who object to an assessment on the basis of lack of uniformity bear the burden of proving the disparity of assessment valuations by clear and convincing evidence. Kankakee County Board of Review v. Property Tax Appeal Board, 131 Ill.2d 1 (1989). After an analysis of the assessment data, the Board finds the appellants have not met this burden.

The Board finds comparables #1, #2, #3, #4 and #7 submitted by the appellants and comparable #1 submitted by the board of review were most similar to the subject in size, style, exterior construction, features and age. Due to their similarities to the subject, these comparables received the most weight in the Board's analysis. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$31.02 to \$58.96 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$51.26 per square foot of living area is within the range established by the most similar comparables. After considering adjustments and the differences in both parties' comparables when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is equitable and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

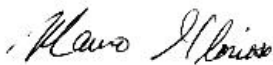

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
