



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Myron Jarosewich

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Myron Jarosewich, the appellant, by attorney James A. DiChristofano of Law Offices of James A. DiChristofano in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds no change in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND: \$ 15,660
IMPR.: \$ 49,742
TOTAL: \$ 65,402**

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

ANALYSIS

The subject property is improved with a two-story dwelling of frame construction containing 2,454 square feet of living area. The dwelling is 98 years old, and it has two apartment units, a full, unfinished basement, central air conditioning, and a two-car garage.

The appellant's appeal is based on unequal treatment in the assessment process. The appellant submitted information on seven comparable properties. On the grid analysis, four of the seven are described as two-story frame dwellings that range in age from 104 to 129 years old. Two comparables have basements; two have central air conditioning; and one has a fireplace. The appellant did not include any information concerning garages for these properties. Three comparables had no detailed description provided other than classification and neighborhood codes, size, and improvement assessment. The seven comparable dwellings are multi-family buildings that range in size from 2,142 to 3,044 square feet of living area. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$10.89 to \$17.18 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment is \$20.27 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the

appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment was disclosed. The board of review presented descriptions and assessment information on four comparable properties consisting of two-story frame multi-family dwellings that range in age from 98 to 121 years old. The dwellings range in size from 1,736 to 2,172 square feet of living area, and each has two or three apartment units. Three comparables have full, unfinished basements, and one has a full, finished basement. Two comparables have two-car garages, and one has central air conditioning. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$22.41 to \$25.00 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal. The Board further finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The appellant contends unequal treatment in the subject's improvement assessment as the basis of the appeal. Taxpayers who object to an assessment on the basis of lack of uniformity bear the burden of proving the disparity of assessment valuations by clear and convincing evidence. Kankakee County Board of Review v. Property Tax Appeal Board, 131 Ill.2d 1 (1989). After an analysis of the assessment data, the Board finds the appellant has not met this burden.

Both parties presented assessment data on a total of eleven equity comparables. The appellant's comparables numbered five, six, and seven received little weight in the Board's analysis, because the appellant did not provide enough information to indicate whether they were actually comparable to the subject property. The appellant's comparables numbered one through three were larger than the subject, and the comparable numbered four by the board of review was much smaller than the subject. These comparables received reduced weight in the Board's analysis. The Board finds the appellant's comparable numbered four and the comparables numbered one through three by the board of review were the most similar to the subject in size. They were also very similar in style, exterior construction, and age. Due to their similarities to the subject, these comparables received the most weight in the Board's analysis. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$15.25 to \$23.72 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$20.27 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the most similar comparables. After considering adjustments and the differences in both parties' comparables when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is equitable and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
