

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Jay Bronner DOCKET NO.: 08-24464.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 14-33-306-042-0000

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Jay Bronner, the appellant, by attorney James E. Doherty, of Thomas M. Tully & Associates in Chicago, and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>no change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

> LAND: \$ 24,442 IMPR.: \$ 280,476 TOTAL: \$ 304,918

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

ANALYSIS

The subject property is improved with a three-story, singlefamily dwelling of masonry construction. The dwelling is eight years old and contains 5,565 square feet of living area. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning, two fireplaces, and a two-car detached garage. The subject is classified as a class 2-09 residential property¹ under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance and is located in Chicago, North Chicago Township, Cook County.

The appellant's appeal is based on unequal treatment in the assessment process. The appellant submitted information on eight suggested properties described as two or three-story, singlefamily dwellings of stucco, masonry, or frame and masonry construction. The comparable properties have the same assigned classification and neighborhood codes as the subject, and one of the comparables is located across the street from the subject. The comparable dwellings are from one to seventeen years old and contain from 5,253 to 6,834 square feet of living area. Five dwellings have full finished basements, and three have full dwelling has central unfinished basements. Each air conditioning; seven dwellings have from one to four fireplaces;

and seven comparables have garages. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$198,979 to \$282,242 or from \$29.31 to \$44.02 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment is \$280,476 or \$50.40 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested that the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$231,504 or \$41.60 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment of \$304,918 was disclosed. The board of review presented descriptions and assessment information on four suggested properties consisting of three-story, single-family dwellings of masonry construction. The comparable properties have the same assigned neighborhood and classification codes as the subject, and each is said to be located one-quarter mile from the subject. The dwellings are from four to sixteen years old and contain from 5,029 to 5,764 square feet of living area. One dwelling has a full unfinished basement, and three have finished basements, either full or Each comparable has central air conditioning, two partial. fireplaces, and a garage. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$146,528 to \$299,208 or from \$28.54 to \$59.29 per square foot of living area. The comparable assessed at \$146,528 or \$28.54 per square foot of living area has a 50% prorated assessment, indicating an assessment at 100% of \$293,056 or \$57.08 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal. The Board further finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The appellant contends unequal treatment in the subject's improvement assessment as the basis of the appeal. Taxpayers who object to an assessment on the basis of lack of uniformity bear the burden of proving the disparity of assessment valuations by clear and convincing evidence. <u>Kankakee County Board of Review</u> <u>v. Property Tax Appeal Board</u>, 131 Ill.2d 1 (1989). After an analysis of the assessment data, the Board finds the appellant has not met this burden.

Both parties presented assessment data on a total of twelve suggested comparables. All of the comparables submitted were two or three-story, single-family dwellings that were located in the same general area as the subject. However, the board of review's comparable #3 and the appellant's comparable #3 were nine and ten years older than the subject, and comparables #4 and #8 had 23% and 15% more living area than the subject. As a result, these four comparables received reduced weight in the Board's analysis.

The Board finds the appellant's comparables #1, #2, and #5-#7 and the board of review's comparables #1, #2, and #4 were more similar to the subject in size and age. Due to their

similarities to the subject, these eight comparables received the most weight in the Board's analysis. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$198,979 to \$298,194 or from \$37.37 to \$59.29 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$280,476 or \$50.40 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the most similar comparables. After considering adjustments and the differences in both parties' comparables when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is equitable and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The constitutional provision for uniformity of taxation and valuation does not require mathematical equality. The requirement is satisfied if the intent is evident to adjust the taxation burden with a reasonable degree of uniformity and if such is the effect of the statue enacted by the General Assembly establishing the method of assessing real property in its general operation. A practical uniformity, rather than an absolute one, is the test. Apex Motor Fuel Co. v. Barrett, 20 Ill. 2d 395 (1960). Although the comparables presented by the appellant disclosed that properties located in the same area are not assessed at identical levels, all that the constitution requires is a practical uniformity which appears to exist on the basis of the evidence. For the foregoing reasons, the Board finds that the appellant has not proven by clear and convincing evidence that the subject property is inequitably assessed. Therefore, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that the subject's assessment as established by the board of review is correct and no reduction is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
