

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Chair Covers by Sylvia

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Chair Covers by Sylvia, the appellant, by attorney Brian P. Liston, of Law Offices of Liston & Tsantilis, P.C. in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds $\underline{a\ reduction}$ in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$ 22,695 **IMPR.:** \$ 14,361 **TOTAL:** \$ 37,056

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2008 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a part two-story, masonry, mixed-use building. The building contains an apartment which is owner-occupied as well as a single-tenant office and warehouse unit. The building contains 6,767 square feet of building area. The building was constructed in 1973, while updated in 2001. The property has a 27,940 square foot site and is located in Lyons Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-12, mixed use, commercial/residential property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted an appraisal estimating the subject property had a market value of \$386,900 as of January 1, 2008. The appraisal indicated that a personal inspection of the subject had been undertaken on October 9, 2008. The appraisal developed the sales comparison approach to value using six sale comparables.

In further support of this argument, the appellant submitted evidence that the subject property was purchased on September 3, 2004 for a price of \$400,000, while also submitting a copy of the settlement statement. Based upon this evidence, the appellant requested an assessment reduction.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$69,294. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$721,813 or \$196.67 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the 2008 three year median level of assessment for class 2 property of 9.60% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted assessor database printouts on seven suggested equity comparables. At hearing, the board's representative argued that the subject's sale is too distant in time to be probative.

In written rebuttal, the appellant's attorney argued that the board of review failed to address the market value argument.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appraisal submitted by the appellant. The Board finds the subject property had a market value of \$386,900 as of the assessment date at issue. Since market value has been established the 2008 three year median level of assessment for class 2 property of 9.60% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue shall apply. (86 Ill.Admin.Code \$1910.50(c)(2).

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.
