



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Peter Bernson

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Peter Bernson, the appellant by attorney Christopher G. Walsh, Jr. in Chicago, and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds no change in the assessment of the property as established by the Cook County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND: \$3,400
IMPR.: \$28,931
TOTAL: \$32,331**

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

ANALYSIS

The subject property consists of 4,475 square foot parcel of land with two improvements. The first improvement contains a two-story multi-family dwelling of frame exterior construction with 1,820 square feet of living area. The dwelling is 96 years old. Features of the home include warm air heating and a one-car garage. The second improvement contains a single story dwelling of frame exterior construction with 602 square feet of living area and a one-car garage.

The appellant's appeal is based on unequal treatment in the assessment process of only the 1st improvement. The appellant submitted information on four comparable properties described from one-story to two-story frame and masonry dwellings that range in age from 74 to 120 years old. The comparable dwellings range in size from 1,720 to 1,986 square feet of living area. Features include from a 2-car garage to 2.5 car garage and full, unfinished basement to finished, full basement. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$11.10 to \$12.90 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment is \$15.90 per square foot of living area. The improvement assessment of the 1st improvement is \$8.78 per square foot, while the improvement assessment on the 2nd improvement is \$20.95 per square foot.

Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment was disclosed. The board of review presented descriptions and assessment information on four comparable properties consisting of two-story frame and masonry dwellings that range in age from 53 to 105 years old. The dwellings range in size from 1,723 to 2,400 square feet of living area. Features include warm air heating to hot water steam heating and from 1 car garage to 2.5 car garage. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$10.46 to \$11.72 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

After reviewing the record and considering the evidence, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of this appeal. The Board further finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The appellant contends unequal treatment in the subject's improvement assessment as the basis of the appeal. Taxpayers who object to an assessment on the basis of lack of uniformity bear the burden of proving the disparity of assessment valuations by clear and convincing evidence. Kankakee County Board of Review v. Property Tax Appeal Board, 131 Ill.2d 1 (1989). After an analysis of the assessment data, the Board finds the appellant has not met this burden.

In totality, the parties submitted eight comparables, all of which support the subject's current assessment. The Board finds the comparables submitted by the appellant parties were most similar to the subject in location, size, style, exterior construction, and age. Due to their similarities to the subject, these comparables received the most weight in the Board's analysis. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$11.10 to \$12.90 per square foot of living area. The subject's 1st improvement assessment of \$8.78 per square foot of living area is below the range established by the most similar comparables. After considering adjustments and the differences in both parties' comparables when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is equitable and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing

complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
