

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Chris Bachman DOCKET NO.: 09-21920.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 10-26-101-015-0000

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Chris Bachman, the appellant(s), by attorney Liat R. Meisler, of Golan & Christie LLP in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>no change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

> LAND: \$ 2,507 IMPR.: \$ 42,052 TOTAL: \$ 44,559

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2009 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board (the "Board") finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject consists of a two-story dwelling of masonry construction with 3,476 square feet of living area. The dwelling is 51 years old. Features of the home include two and one-half baths and a partial unfinished basement. The property has a 2,950 square foot site, and is located in Niles Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-12 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance. The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted an appraisal estimating the subject property had a market value of \$280,000 as of January 25, 2006.

The appraiser used the sales comparison approach to value to arrive at market value and determined the highest and best use to be its current use. Under the sales comparison approach, the appraiser analyzed the sales of buildings located within the subject's market. The properties contain between 4,000 and 7,371 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from March 2002 to July 2004 for prices ranging from \$307,700 to \$745,000, or from \$68.38 to \$105.52 per square foot of building area, including land. The appraiser adjusted each of the Based on the similarities comparables for pertinent factors. and differences of the comparables when compared to the subject, the appraiser estimated a value for the subject under the sales comparison approach of \$80.00 per square foot of building area, including land or \$280,000, rounded.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$44,559. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$500,663, or \$144.03 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the 2009 three year average median level of assessment for class 2 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance of 8.90% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist appraisal of the subject property, a recent of an sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The Board does not find the appraisal submitted by the appellant persuasive. In determining the fair market value of the subject

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property, the Board finds the appellant's appraisal date of value of January 1, 2006 too far removed from the lien date to accurately reflect the subject's market value as of January 1, 2009. The appraisal is three years old and uses comparables whose sale dates range from March 2002 to July 2004. The appellant failed to provide any recent sales comparables or an updated appraisal as evidence to support the subject market value as of January 1, 2009.

Additionally, no weight was given to the equity comparables provided by the board of review as this evidence does not address the appellant's market value argument.

Accordingly, in determining the fair market value of the subject property, the Board finds that the appellant failed to submit sufficient evidence to show the subject was overvalued. Therefore, the Board finds that the appellant has not met its burden by a preponderance of the evidence and that the subject does not warrant a reduction based upon the market data submitted into evidence. This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

Member

Member

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"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.
