

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Worth Hill

DOCKET NO.: 12-01158.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 15-27-454-023

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Worth Hill, the appellant, by attorney Jerri K. Bush in Chicago, and the Kane County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>a reduction</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Kane** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$2,848 **IMPR.:** \$14,152 **TOTAL:** \$17,000

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Kane County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) contesting the assessment for the 2012 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of frame construction with 1,248 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1929. Features of the property include a full basement, central air conditioning and a detached garage with 264 square feet of building area. The property has a 8,100 square foot site and is located in Aurora, Aurora Township, Kane County.

The appellant's appeal is based on overvaluation. In support of this argument the appellant submitted evidence disclosing the subject property was purchased on September 22, 2009 for a price of \$51,000. The appellant also submitted a comparative market analysis using six comparable sales improved with dwellings similar to the subject in style that ranged in size from 1,026 to 1,475 square feet of living area. The comparables sold from June 2011 to June 2012 for prices ranging from \$20,000 to \$45,000 or from \$17.36 to \$40.74 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$10,857.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$23,331. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$69,958 or \$56.06 per square foot of living area, including land, when using the 2012 three year average median level of assessment for Kane County of 33.35% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

The board of review submitted a statement asserting that appellant's comparable sales #1, #5 and #6 were HUD sales and comparables #3, #5 and #6 sold in 2012. The board of review also submitted a grid analysis of the appellant's comparable sales which reported the dwellings as being built from 1900 to 1927 and gave different size estimates for comparable sales #1 and #6.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted a grid analysis prepared by the township assessor containing information on three equity comparables.

In rebuttal the appellant's counsel asserted in part that the equity comparables provided by the board of review should be given little to no weight because the appeal was not based on equity. Counsel also asserted that pursuant to section 16-55(b) of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-55(b)) the board of review must include compulsory sales in reviewing and correcting assessments if the compulsory sales reflect the same property characteristics and condition as the subject property.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the

property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The Board finds the appellant presented evidence disclosing the subject property was purchased in September 2009 for a price of \$51,000 or \$40.87 per square foot of living area, including The appellant provided evidence demonstrating the sale had elements of an arm's length transaction. The appellant completed portions of Section IV - Recent Sale Data of the appeal disclosing the parties to the transaction were not related, the property was sold using a Realtor and the property had been advertised on the open market with the Multiple Listing In further support of the transaction the appellant submitted a copy of the settlement statement, a copy of the MLS listing indicating the property was originally listed for a price of \$77,000 and a copy of the Listing & Property History Report. The Board also finds the listing sheet indicates the property was in pre-foreclosure and was being sold "as is." Board finds, however, the sale is somewhat dated with reference to the assessment date at issue.

The appellant also provided information on six comparable sales that were relatively similar to the subject in style, age and size. These properties sold from sold from June 2011 to June 2012 for prices ranging from \$20,000 to \$45,000 or from \$17.36 to \$40.74 per square foot of living area, including land. According to the board of review comparable sales #1, #5 and #6 were HUD sales. Section 1-23 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/1-23) defines a compulsory sale as:

"Compulsory sale" means (i) the sale of real estate for less than the amount owed to the mortgage lender or mortgagor, if the lender or mortgagor has agreed to the sale, commonly referred to as a "short sale" and (ii) the first sale of real estate owned by a financial institution as a result of a judgment of foreclosure, transfer pursuant to a deed in lieu of foreclosure, or consent judgment, occurring after the foreclosure proceeding is complete.

Furthermore, section 16-183 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-183) provides:

Compulsory sales. The Property Tax Appeal Board shall consider compulsory sales of comparable properties for the purpose of revising and correcting assessments, including those compulsory sales of comparable properties submitted by the taxpayer.

Therefore, the Property Tax Appeal Board will give some consideration to these sales.

The Board finds the subject's purchase price of \$51,000 or \$40.87 per square foot of living area, including land, as well as the prices for the comparables ranging from \$20,000 to \$45,000 or from \$17.36 to \$40.74 per square foot of living area, including land, are below the market value reflected by the subject's assessment of \$69,958 or \$56.06 per square foot of living area, including land. The Board finds the board of review equity comparables did not address the appellant's overvaluation argument. Based on this record the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A $\frac{\text{PETITION}}{\text{AND}}$ EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.
