



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Howard Sachs, the appellant, by attorney Timothy E. Moran of Schmidt Salzman & Moran, Ltd in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$7,937
IMPR.: \$24,310
TOTAL: \$32,247

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2012 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of frame construction. The dwelling is an apartment building that is approximately 129 years old and has 2,200 square feet of living area. Features of the building include two apartment units, a concrete slab foundation and a two-car garage. The property has a 3,175 square foot site and is located in Chicago, West Chicago Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-11 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables; however, the appellant did not provide any information on the comparables' foundations.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$32,247. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$24,310 or \$11.05 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted information on a total of eight suggested equity comparables. All of the comparables submitted had the same assigned neighborhood and classification codes as the subject. However, the appellant's comparables had significantly more living area than the subject, and comparables #3 and #4 were three-story in design, not two-story like the subject. Moreover, the appellant did not provide any information on the comparables' foundations. As a result, the appellant's comparables received reduced weight in the Board's analysis. Board of review comparables #3 and #4 also had significantly more living area than the subject and likewise received reduced weight.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be board of review comparable #1. This comparable was a two-story building with a concrete slab foundation like the subject and was most similar to the subject in age and living area. As further support, the Board finds board of review comparable #2, despite having a full finished basement, was located in the same block as the subject and was very similar to the subject in story height, exterior construction, age and living area. The two most similar comparables had improvement assessments of \$12.16 and \$15.90 per square foot of living area.¹ The subject's improvement assessment of \$11.05 per square foot of living area falls below the improvement assessments of the best comparables in this record. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

¹ The Board considered adjustments and differences in the comparables when compared to the subject. Board of review comparable #2 had a full finished basement, while the subject had a concrete slab foundation. The superior attribute of a basement helps to explain why board of review comparable #2 had a higher improvement assessment than the subject.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of

the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
