

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Joseph Fontana DOCKET NO.: 13-00704.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 14-32-255-005

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Joseph Fontana, the appellant, by attorney Clyde B. Hendricks in Peoria, and the Peoria County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>a reduction</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Peoria** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$2,780 **IMPR.:** \$1,220 **TOTAL:** \$4,000

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Peoria County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2013 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a one-story dwelling of frame construction with 768 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1930. Features of the home include a partial basement that is unfinished and a 252 square foot detached

garage. The property has a .09-acre site and is located in Peoria, City of Peoria Township, Peoria County.

The appellant's appeal is based on overvaluation. In support of this argument the appellant submitted evidence disclosing the subject property was purchased on July 26, 2012 for a price of \$12,000. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment to reflect the purchase price.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$9,000. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$27,149 or \$35.35 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2013 three year average median level of assessment for Peoria County of 33.15% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In rebuttal, the board of review argued the subject was sold in April 2012 for a price of \$41,788. The board of review's evidence included the Illinois Real Estate Transfer Declaration (PTAX-203) form for the subject's April 2012 sale, which was marked that the property was not advertised for sale.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on three comparable sales.

In rebuttal, the appellant argued that the board of review's sales grid is not appropriate for a recent sales case. In addition, the appellant argued the subject had an asking price of \$10,300 and sold for \$12,000.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the purchase of the subject property in July 2012 for a price of \$12,000. The appellant provided evidence demonstrating the sale

had the elements of an arm's length transaction. The appellant completed Section IV - Recent Sale Data of the appeal disclosing the parties to the transaction were not related, the property was sold using a Realtor, the property had been advertised on the open market through the Multiple Listing Service and it had been on the market for 20 days. In further support of the transaction the appellant submitted a copy of the subject's settlement statement and the PTAX-203 Illinois Real Estate Transfer Declaration. The Board finds the purchase price is below the market value reflected by its assessment. The Board gave less weight to the board of review's assertion that the previous sale of the subject was reflective of market value, due to the fact that that sale was not advertised for sale. Based on this record, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment commensurate with the appellant's request is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.
