

# FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Jessica & Joseph Ambrosia

DOCKET NO.: 13-20303.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 10-24-401-022-0000

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Jessica & Joseph Ambrosia, the appellant(s); and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>no change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$ 6,451 **IMPR.:** \$15,257 **TOTAL:** \$21,708

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

# Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2013 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

#### Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 63-year-old, one-story dwelling with 1,108 square feet of living area of frame and masonry construction. Features of the home include a central air conditioning, a fireplace and a two-car garage. The property

has a 7,820 square foot site and is located in Evanston Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends overvaluation and assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. In support of those arguments the appellant submitted information on four suggested equity comparables with sales data on each property. The properties are described as one-story, single-family dwellings ranging: in age from 58 to 64 years; in size from 980 to 1,100 square feet of living area; and in improvement assessment from \$12.31 to \$20.03 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$21,708. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$15,257 or \$13.77 per square foot of living area. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$215,785 or \$194.75 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the 2013 three year median level of assessment for class 2 property of 10.06% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on eight equity comparables with sales data on five properties. Those comparables range: in age from 59 to 75 years; in size from 1,014 to 1,523 square feet; in improvement assessments from \$13.90 to \$25.15 per square foot of living area; and market value from \$190.98 to \$371.48 per square foot of living area.

#### Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be appellant's comparable sales #3 and the board of review's comparable sales #1, from the equity grid, and #1, from the sale

grid. These comparables sold for prices ranging from \$144.86 to \$201.20 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$194.75 per square foot of living area, including land, which is within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. Based on this evidence the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

The taxpayer also contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be appellant's comparables #3 and the board of review's comparables #1, #2, and #3. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$18.34 to \$20.14 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$13.77 per square foot of living area falls below the range established by the best comparables in this record. Based on this record the Board appellant did not demonstrate with clear convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.
