

# FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Robert Hartoun, the appellant, by attorney Abby L. Strauss, of Schiller Strauss & Lavin PC in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>A Reduction</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$5,154 **IMPR.:** \$53,664 **TOTAL:** \$58,818

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

#### **Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2013 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

#### **Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 4,044 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately seven years old. Features of the home include a full finished basement, central air conditioning, two fireplaces and a two-car garage. The property has a 7,364 square foot site and is located in Skokie, Niles Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-08 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on three equity comparables with the same neighborhood assessment code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of masonry or frame and masonry exterior construction that are 6 or 19 years old. The comparables had features with varying degrees of similarity when compared to the subject.

The dwellings range in size from 3,878 to 4,176 square feet of living area and have improvement assessments ranging from \$48,237 to \$55,290 or from \$11.84 to \$13.29 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the total assessment be reduced to \$56,877.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$60,969. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$55,815 or \$13.80 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of masonry exterior construction that range in age from 6 to 10 years old. The comparables had features with varying degrees of similarity when compared to the subject. The dwellings range in size from 3,880 to 4,142 square feet of living area and have improvement assessments that range from \$57,644 to \$61,455 or from \$14.07 to \$15.00 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

In written rebuttal, counsel for the appellant asserted the board of review's evidence is located in a "different location" (or neighborhood code).

#### **Conclusion of Law**

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The parties submitted seven suggested equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparable #1 due to its older age when compared to the subject property. The Board also gave less weight to the board of review's comparables due to their dissimilar neighborhood code when compared to the subject property. The board of review failed to identify the proximate location of the comparables in relationship to the subject. The Board finds the appellant's comparables #2 and #3 are more similar when compared to the subject in location, age, design, dwelling size, exterior construction and features. These comparables had improvement assessments of \$13.24 or \$13.29 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$13.80 per square foot of living area falls above the best comparables in this record. Based on this record the Board finds the appellant did demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is justified.

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of

the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for the subsequent year directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
