



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Donna Maibuecher, the appellant, by attorney Stephanie Park, of Park & Longstreet, P.C. in Rolling Meadows; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **A Reduction** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$5,460
IMPR.: \$22,080
TOTAL: \$27,540

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2015 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1.5-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 1,530 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 67 years old. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning and a two-car detached garage. The property has a 3,900 square foot site and is located in Chicago, Jefferson Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-03 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity and overvaluation as the bases of the appeal. In support of the inequity argument the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables located within the same neighborhood assessment code as the subject property. The comparables consist of 1.5-story dwellings that range in age from 64 to 77 years old. The comparables had features with varying degrees of similarity when compared to the subject. The dwellings range

in size from 1,528 to 1,619 square feet of living area and have improvement assessments ranging from \$20,141 to \$22,763 or from \$13.18 to \$14.38 per square foot of living area.

In support of the overvaluation argument, the appellant submitted four comparable sales located within the same neighborhood assessment code as the subject property. The comparables consist of 1.5-story dwellings that range in age from 63 to 86 years old. The dwellings had features with varying degrees of similarity when compared to the subject. The dwellings range in size from 1,512 to 1,581 square feet of living area and are situated on sites ranging in size from 3,720 to 4,250 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from April 2012 to January 2016 for prices ranging from \$222,500 to \$280,000 or from \$143.92 to \$185.19 per square foot of living area including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the total assessment be reduced to \$22,020.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$32,111. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$321,110 or \$209.88 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the level of assessments for class 2 property of 10% under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$26,651 or \$17.42 per square foot of living area.

In support of the subject's assessment, the board of review submitted information on three equity comparables located within the same neighborhood assessment code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with 1.5-story dwellings that are 63 and 67 years old. The comparables had varying degrees of similarity when compared to the subject. The dwellings range in size from 1,287 to 1,616 square feet of living area and are situated on sites that each contain 3,900 square feet of land area. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$23,400 to \$28,767 or from \$17.20 to \$18.18 per square foot of living area.

The board of review failed to provide any sales data in order to address the appellant's overvaluation argument.

Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

In written rebuttal, counsel for the appellant argued the board of review's comparables should be given no weight because the comparables lacked sales data.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value in the record to be the appellant's comparables #3 and #4. These properties sold proximate in time to the January 1, 2015

assessment date at issue and were similar to the subject in location, dwelling design, size, exterior construction and other features. These comparables sold for prices of \$275,000 and \$280,000 or \$175.72 and \$185.19 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's total assessment reflects a market value of \$321,110 or \$209.88 per square foot of living area, including land which falls above the best comparables established in this record. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparables #1 and #2 due to their 2012 sale dates, which are not proximate in time to the January 1, 2015 assessment date. Based on this record the Board finds the subject's assessment is not reflective of market value and a reduction in the subject's assessment is justified.

Based on a reduction to the subject's assessment based on overvaluation, the Board finds the subject has a revised improvement assessment of \$14.43 per square foot of living area, which is within the range established by the comparables submitted by the parties. Therefore, the Board finds a further reduction based on assessment inequity is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
