



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Belden Management

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Belden Management, the appellant, by attorney Abby L. Strauss of Schiller Strauss & Lavin PC in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$14,175
IMPR.: \$102,271
TOTAL: \$116,446

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2015 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property is improved with a four-story, multi-family dwelling of masonry construction.¹ The dwelling is approximately 108 years old and has 5,160 square feet of living area. Features of the dwelling include a full finished basement and central air conditioning. According to the appellant, the dwelling has four apartment units. The property has a 1,575 square foot site and is located in Chicago, North Chicago Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-11 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on three equity comparables with the same assigned neighborhood and classification codes as the subject. The comparables are improved

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with three-story, multi-family dwellings of masonry construction.² The dwellings are from 123 to 127 years old and contain from 4,908 to 5,516 square feet of living area. Each comparable has three apartment units and a full basement, one of which is finished with an apartment. Two comparables have garages. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$60,425 to \$90,375 or from \$11.78 to \$16.38 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment to \$73,272 or \$14.20 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment of \$116,446 was disclosed. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$102,271 or \$19.82 per square foot of living area. The board of review presented descriptions and assessment information on four suggested comparable properties with the same assigned neighborhood and classification codes as the subject. Three of the comparables were described as being located one-quarter mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with two or three-story, multi-family dwellings of masonry construction. The dwellings are from 107 to 127 years old and contain from 4,600 to 5,244 square feet of living area. The board of review did not provide information regarding the number of apartment units in each dwelling. Each comparable has a full basement, two of which are finished with apartments; one comparable has central air conditioning; another has a fireplace; and three comparables have garages. The comparable properties have improvement assessments that range from \$92,741 to \$118,135 or from \$20.08 to \$22.53 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties presented assessment data on a total of seven suggested comparables. The Board finds that none of the comparables were four-story in design like the subject and only one of the comparables had central air conditioning like the subject. Although none of the comparables was sufficiently similar to the subject property, the Board finds that all of the comparables submitted had improvement assessments that ranged from \$60,425 to \$118,135 or from \$11.78 to \$22.53 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$102,271 or \$19.82 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the comparables submitted for this appeal. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

² The appellant did not provide information regarding the comparables' story height; however, the appellant's photographic evidence revealed the comparables were three-story in design.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
