

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are American Homes 4 Rent Pro, the appellant, by attorney Michael R. Davies of Ryan Law LLP in Chicago; and the Will County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *no change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Will** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$11,700 **IMPR.:** \$49,500 **TOTAL:** \$61,200

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Will County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2016 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property is improved with a two-story dwelling of frame and brick construction with 2,386 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2003. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning, and a two-car attached garage with 420 square feet of building area. The property has a 9,849 square foot site and is located in Troy Township, Will County.

The appellant's appeal is based on overvaluation. In support of this argument the appellant submitted evidence disclosing the subject property was purchased in April 2013 for a price of \$165,000. The appellant reported it purchased the subject property from Tamika Butler. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment to \$55,000.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$61,200. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$184,005 or \$77.12 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2016 three-year average median level of assessment for Will County of 33.26% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue. The subject has an improvement assessment of \$49,500 or \$20.75 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located in the same subdivision as the subject property that are improved with two-story dwellings that range in size from 2,264 to 2,386 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2001 to 2004. Each property has a partial basement, central air conditioning and a two-car or three-car attached garage that range in size from 420 to 786 square feet of building area. The sales occurred from November 2014 to May 2016 for prices ranging from \$190,000 to \$227,000 or from \$83.92 to \$95.14 per square foot of living area, including land. The comparables have total assessments ranging from \$60,700 to \$63,750 and improvement assessments ranging from \$49,000 to \$52,050 or from \$20.68 to \$21.90 per square foot of living area.

Based on this evidence the board of review requested the subject's assessment be increased to \$68,431 to reflect a market value of \$205,315.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value in the record to be the comparable sales submitted by the board of review. These comparables were similar to the subject in location, style, construction, size, features and age. These properties also sold more proximate in time to the assessment date at issue than did the subject property. The comparables sold for prices ranging from \$190,000 to \$227,000 or from \$83.92 to \$95.14 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$184,005 or \$77.12 per square foot of living area, including land, which is below the range established by the board of review comparable sales demonstrating the subject property is not overvalued. The Board gave little weight to the subject's sale due to the fact the sale did not occur proximate in time to the assessment date at issue and the appellant failed to provide evidence demonstrating the purchase had the elements of an arm's length transaction. Based on this record the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment based on overvaluation is not justified.

The Board denies the board of review request to increase the subject's assessment as the evidence disclosed there exists a practical uniformity of assessments between the comparables presented by the board of review and the subject property. (See <u>Apex Motor Fuel Co. v. Barrett</u>,

20 Ill.2d 395 (1960)). Increasing the subject's assessment as requested by the board of review would result in an inequitable assessment of the subject property.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
