

# FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: AMH 20142 Borrower LLC

DOCKET NO.: 16-06008.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 07-33-118-010

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are AMH 20142 Borrower LLC, the appellant, by attorney Michael R. Davies, of Ryan Law LLP in Chicago; and the DuPage County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **DuPage** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$21,900 IMPR.: \$58,630 TOTAL: \$80,530

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

## **Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the DuPage County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2016 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

#### **Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a ranch dwelling of frame construction with 1,376 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1997. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, a fireplace and a 441 square foot garage. The property has a 7,840 square foot site and is located in Aurora, Naperville Township, DuPage County.

The appellant submitted evidence before the Property Tax Appeal Board claiming overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of the overvaluation claim, the appellant submitted limited descriptive information for fifteen comparable sale properties reported to be located from .05 of a mile to 1 mile from the subject property. The Board requested that the appellant complete the grid analysis in Section V of the appeal petition. The appellant failed to comply with the Board's request and failed to disclose the comparables' exterior construction, foundation type and features such as central air conditioning, fireplaces and garages. The comparables consist of

one-story dwellings that were built from 1959 to 1997 and ranging in size from 1,228 to 1,560 square feet of above grade living area. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 6,000 to 23,983 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from December 2012 to June 2015 for prices ranging from \$116,000 to \$233,000 or from \$92.95 to \$169.33 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$80,530. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$241,904 or \$175.80 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2016 three year average median level of assessment for DuPage County of 33.29% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In response to the appellant's submission, the board of review submitted a map depicting the locations of the subject and both parties comparables, a spreadsheet and property record cards for the appellant's comparables #1 through #4.1

In further support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted a grid analysis on four comparable sales located within same neighborhood code as the subject as defined by the local assessor. The comparables are described as ranch dwellings of frame construction containing 1,376 square feet of living area. The comparables were built from 1995 to 1997. The comparables have basements, with one having finished area. Two comparables have a fireplace and each comparable has a garage with 441 square feet of building area. The comparables have sites containing either 7,840 or 10,285 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from June 2014 to July 2016 for prices ranging from \$255,000 to \$281,000 or from \$185.32 to \$204.22 per square foot of living area, including land.

Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

# **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted nineteen suggested comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparables #3 through #8 and #11 through #15 along with board of review comparables #2 and #3. These properties sold from 2012 to 2014, which are dated and less likely to be reflective of market value as of the subject's January 1, 2016 assessment date. In addition, the Board gave less weight to appellant's comparable #1, #3 and

#4 for their lack of a basement when compared to the subject's basement. Lastly, appellant's comparables #9 and #10 were dissimilar in age to the subject thus reduced weight was given.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be appellant's comparable #2 along with board of review comparables #1 and #4. These three comparables sold most proximate in time to the subject's January 1, 2016 assessment date and were most similar to the subject in location, dwelling size, design, age, and most features. These properties sold in January 2015 to July 2016 for prices ranging from \$230,000 to \$281,000 or from \$167.15 to \$204.22 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$241,904 or \$175.80 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales contained in the record. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's estimated market value as reflected by its assessment is supported. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant failed to demonstrate by a preponderance of the evidence that the subject was overvalued and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

Date:

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.
