

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Ghanshyam Patel, the appellant, by attorney John S. Xydakis, of the Law Offices of John S. Xydakis in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$10,910 **IMPR.:** \$62,814 **TOTAL:** \$73,724

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2016 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of masonry construction. The dwelling is approximately 29 years old and has 4,067 square feet of living area. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a two-car garage. The property has a 10,910 square-foot site and is located in Glenview, Northfield Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-08 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables with the same neighborhood and classification codes as the subject. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of masonry or frame and masonry construction. The dwellings are from one to sixty-one years old and contain from 3,949 to 4727 square feet of living area. Each comparable

has central air conditioning, and three comparables have a basement and a fireplace. Information regarding garages was not provided on the appellant's grid analysis; however, the appellant's photographic evidence disclosed that each comparable has a garage. The appellant also submitted a map which revealed the comparables were located in the same general area as the subject property. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$47,610 to \$53,621 or from \$10.48 to \$12.78 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment to \$47,787 or \$11.75 per quare foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" wherein the subject's final assessment of \$73,724 was disclosed. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$62,814 or \$15.44 per square foot of living area. The board of review presented descriptions and assessment information on four comparable properties with the same classification code as the subject. Although the comparables have a different neighborhood code than the subject, their parcel index numbers indicate they are located in the same township section as the subject property. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of masonry, frame and masonry, or frame construction. The dwellings are from 18 to 27 years old and contain from 3,813 to 4,754 square feet of living area. The comparables have unfinished basements, either full or partial; central air conditioning; one or two fireplaces; and garages that range from two-car to three-car. The board of review's comparable properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$69,244 to \$86,594 or from \$18.16 to \$18.58 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The Board finds the parties presented assessment data on a total of eight suggested comparables. The appellant's comparables received reduced weight in the Board's analysis because they differed significantly from the subject in age. The Board finds the board of review comparables were more similar to the subject in age and comparables #1, #3 and #4 were very similar in living area. Although the board of review comparables had a different assigned neighborhood code than the subject, their parcel index numbers indicated they were located in the same general area as the subject. The board of review comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$69,244 to \$86,594 or from \$18.16 to \$18.58 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$62,814 or \$15.44 per square foot of living area falls below the range established by the best comparables in this record. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
