

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Ross Feldstein DOCKET NO.: 17-02809.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 15-21-411-031

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Ross Feldstein, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$44,084 **IMPR.:** \$135,470 **TOTAL:** \$179,554

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 2,861 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1997. Features of the home include a partial unfinished basement, central air conditioning, one fireplace and a 600 square foot attached garage. The property has a 10,019 square foot site and is located in Buffalo Grove, Vernon Township, Lake County.

The appellant's appeal is based on overvaluation. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on five comparable sales located from .02 to .19 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are described as two-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 2,843 to 3,757 square feet of living area. The dwellings were constructed in 1997 or 1998. Features of each comparable include a basement with four having finished area; central air conditioning and an attached garage ranging in size from 651 to 736

square feet of building area. Three comparables each have one fireplace. The properties have sites ranging in size from 10,019 to 17,860 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from May to October 2016 for prices ranging from \$553,000 to \$590,000 or from \$148.79 to \$194.51 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's total assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$179,554. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$541,641 or \$189.32 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the 2017 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.15% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of the subject's assessment, the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located within .263 of a mile from the subject property.¹ The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction that range in size from 2,621 to 2,988 square feet of living area. The dwellings were constructed from 1996 to 1998. Features of each comparable include a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, one fireplace and an attached garage with either 483 or 736 square feet of building area. The properties have sites ranging in size from 10,454 to 12,632 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from June 2016 to December 2017 for prices ranging from \$525,000 to \$670,000 or from \$194.51 to \$224.23 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested that the subject property's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The Board finds the parties submitted eight comparable sales for the Board's consideration, which includes one comparable common to both parties. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparable #1 through #4 due to their larger dwelling sizes when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the board of review comparable sales which includes the parties' common comparable. The Board finds these comparables are similar to the subject in location, dwelling size, design, age and features except all of the comparables have finished basement area. These comparables sold from June 2016 to December 2017 for prices ranging from \$525,000 to \$670,000 or from \$194.51 to \$224.23 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$541,641 or \$189.32 per square foot of living area, including land, which is supported by the range established by the most similar comparable sales in this record. After considering adjustments to the comparables

for differences including finished basement area when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's estimated market value as reflected by its assessment is supported. Based on this record, the Board finds that no reduction in the subject's assessment is justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
