



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Jason & Linda Park

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Jason & Linda Park, the appellants, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds No Change in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$66,612
IMPR.: \$146,700
TOTAL: \$213,312

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 3,516 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2000. Features of the home include a full basement with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 745 square foot garage. The property has a 23,783 square foot site and is located in Mundelein, Fremont Township, Lake County.

The appellants contend overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellants submitted information on three comparable sales located within 0.40 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables range from 16,988 to 35,015 square feet of land area and area improved with two-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction that range from 3,270 to 3,752 square feet of living area. The homes were built in 1996 or 1997. The comparables have basements with finished area, central air conditioning, one or three fireplaces

and attached garages that range from 671 to 850 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from January 2015 to December 2015 for prices ranging from \$510,000 to \$540,000 or from \$139.93 to \$158.82 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$177,640.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$213,312. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$643,475 or \$183.01 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2017 three year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.15% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located within 0.35 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables range from 14,375 to 19,166 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of brick, stone and Dryvit exterior construction that range from 3,375 to 3,774 square feet of living area. The homes were built in 1998 or 1999. The comparables have basements with finished area, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and attached garages that range from 580 to 744 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from October 2015 to December 2017 for prices ranging from \$590,000 to \$680,500 or from \$174.81 to \$182.16 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The appellants contend the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellants did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted seven comparables for the Board's consideration. The comparables have a high degree of similarity when compared to the subject in terms of location, design, age, dwelling size and features. The Board gives least weight to the appellants' comparable #2 due to its January 2015 sale date which is less indicative of fair market value as of the subject's January 1, 2017 assessment date. The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be appellants' comparable sales #1 and #3 and board of review comparable sales #1 through #4 which have sale dates more proximate to the January 1, 2017 assessment date. These most similar comparables sold from September 2015 and December 2017 for prices ranging from \$510,000 to \$680,500 or from \$155.96 to \$182.16 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$643,475 or \$183.01 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the overall market value range and above the price per square foot range established by the best comparable sales in this record. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences in site size from the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
