



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Julie A. Andrea, the appellant, by attorney Jessica Hill-Magiera, Attorney at Law in Lake Zurich; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$184,761
IMPR.: \$326,967
TOTAL: \$511,728

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 6,205 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1997. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, three fireplaces and a 1,713 square foot garage. The property has a 60,113 square foot site and is located in Lake Forest, West Deerfield Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. The subject's land assessment was not contested. In support of this argument the appellant submitted gridded information on eight equity comparables located within 0.15 of a mile from the subject property. The comparable parcels are improved with 2-story dwellings that range in size from 5,832 to 6,651 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1990 to 1999. Each of the comparables has a basement. No additional detail was provided for the equity comparables such

as basement finish, garage size, central air conditioning, fireplaces or room counts. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$245,911 to \$300,198 or from \$39.09 to \$45.14 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$242,529 or \$39.09 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$511,728. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$326,967 or \$52.69 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on seven equity comparables located within 0.35 of a mile from the subject property. The comparable parcels are improved with a 1.5-story and six, 2-story dwellings that range in size from 5,998 to 6,882 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1991 to 2002. Each comparable has a basement, two with finished area, central air conditioning, one to three fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 866 to 1,716 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$328,037 to \$418,466 or from \$49.57 to \$61.48 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted 15 equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #3 and #5 through #8 since limited details were provided regarding each of the appellant's comparables. The Board also give less weight to the board of review comparables #1, #3, #4, #5 and #7 due to differences in dwelling size, finished basement or design when compared to the subject. The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be appellant's comparables #2 and #4 along with board of review comparables #2 and #6. The appellant's comparables have been selected based on proximity, dwelling size and age which are similar to the subject. The board of review comparables are more similar to the subject in terms of age, location, dwelling size, unfinished basement and garage size. These best comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$262,362 to \$356,731 or from \$40.14 to \$59.47 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$326,967 or \$52.69 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record. After considering any identifiable adjustments to the comparables for differences with the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
