



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Ahmet Alegoz

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Ahmet Alegoz, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$56,521  
**IMPR.:** \$141,225  
**TOTAL:** \$197,746

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a one-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 3,189 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1992. Features of the home include an unfinished full basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 1,008 square foot garage. The property has a 74,553 square foot site and is located in Kildeer, Ela Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on three comparable sales located within 1.80 miles from the subject where two are outside of the subject's neighborhood code. The comparables have sites that range in size from 47,601 to 71,654 square feet of land area and are improved with one-story dwellings of brick exterior construction that range in size from 2,992 to 3,168 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1986 to 1995. Each comparable has an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 784 to

1,350 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from February 2015 to April 2017 for prices ranging from \$480,000 to \$525,000 or from \$160.32 to \$165.72 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$172,372.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$197,746. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$596,519 or \$187.06 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2017 three year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.15% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on seven comparable sales located within approximately 0.75 of a mile from the subject and all outside the subject's neighborhood code. The comparables have sites that range in size from 12,617 to 68,989 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of brick or wood siding exterior construction that range in size from 2,915 to 3,385 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1988 to 1994. Each comparable has a basement, three with finished area;<sup>1</sup> central air conditioning; one fireplace and a garage ranging in size from 660 to 858 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from July 2016 to March 2018 for prices ranging from \$607,000 to \$685,000 or from \$182.42 to \$211.84 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted ten comparables for the Board's consideration. The comparables have varying degrees of similarity to the subject in terms of age, location, design and site size. The Board gives least weight to the appellant's comparables #1 and #2 along with board of review comparable #2 which have sale dates in 2015 or 2018. These sale dates are less proximate in time to the January 1, 2017 assessment date and therefore less indicative of the subject's market value as of that date. The Board also gives little weight to board of review #1, #3, #5 and #6 due to the presence of a finished basement, which the subject lacks and/or significantly smaller site size relative to the subject. The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appellant's comparable #3 along with board of review comparables #4 and #7 which are more similar in site size, dwelling size, unfinished basement and most features. These most similar comparables sold from July 2016 to April 2017 for prices ranging from \$525,000 to \$625,000 or from \$165.72 to \$194.46 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$596,519 or \$187.06 per square foot of living area, including land,

which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences with the subject's site, dwelling and garage size, the Board finds a preponderance of the evidence does not support a reduction in the subject's assessment.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
