



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Thomas and Anna Sulikowski

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Thomas and Anna Sulikowski, the appellants, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$79,665
IMPR.: \$156,314
TOTAL: \$235,979

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 3,462 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1964 with an addition in 2016. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, one fireplace and an attached garage with 775 square feet of building area. The property has a 165,617 square foot site and is located in North Barrington, Cuba Township, Lake County.

The appellants contend assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellants submitted information on three equity comparables improved with two-story dwellings with wood siding or brick exteriors that range in size from 3,024 to 3,580 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1963 to 1979. Each home has a basement that is partially finished, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and an attached garage ranging in size from 528 to 864 square feet of building area.

The comparables are located from .17 to 1.96 miles from the subject property. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$79,884 to \$136,810 or from \$25.95 to \$38.22 per square foot of living area. The appellants requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$109,791.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$235,979. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$156,314 or \$45.15 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables improved with two-story dwellings with brick, stucco, wood siding or vinyl siding exteriors ranging in size from 3,229 to 3,472 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1965 to 1973. Each comparable has a basement that is partially finished, central air conditioning, two or three fireplaces and an attached garage ranging in size from 576 to 676 square feet of building area. The comparables are located from 1.072 to 1.211 miles from the subject property. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$140,916 to \$171,040 or from \$43.64 to \$50.13 per square foot of living area.

The board of review contends the subject property has an effective date of construction of 1976 due to the recent \$204,000 addition. It reported its comparables have effective ages from 1965 to 1976.

The board of review requested the assessment be sustained.

Conclusion of Law

The appellants contend assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellants did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains seven comparables submitted by the parties to support their respective positions. The Board gives less weight to the appellants' comparables #1 and #2 due to differences from the subject dwelling in size and/or effective age. The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be appellants' comparable #3 and the comparables submitted by the board of review as these properties are most similar to the subject dwelling in effective age, size and features. These properties have improvement assessments ranging from \$136,810 to \$171,040 or from \$38.22 to \$50.13 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$156,314 or \$45.15 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record. Based on this record the Board finds the appellants did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
