



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Parviz Boroumand

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Parviz Boroumand, the appellant, by attorney Brian S. Maher, of Weis, DuBrock, Doody & Maher, in Chicago, and the DuPage County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **DuPage** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$25,990
IMPR.: \$192,370
TOTAL: \$218,360

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the DuPage County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 3,559 square feet of living area.¹ The dwelling was constructed in 2007. Features of the home include a three-car garage. The property has a 11,200 square foot site and is located in Downers Grove, York Township, DuPage County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted limited information on four equity comparables located in the same neighborhood code assigned by the assessor as the subject property. The comparables consist of two-story dwellings of masonry, frame or stucco exterior construction that were built from 1993 to 2006. The homes range in size from 3,563 to 5,039

square feet of living area and feature basements. Each comparable has a two-car or a three-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$169,560 to \$236,170 or from \$46.87 to \$50.81 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduced improvement assessment of \$172,540 or \$48.48 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$218,360. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$192,370 or \$54.05 per square foot of living area.

The board of review failed to supply a copy of the subject's property record card and presented a spreadsheet with limited data for the subject and both parties' comparables which failed to identify amenities such as finished basement, central air conditioning, fireplaces and/or other improvements to the properties.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on seven equity comparables located in the same neighborhood code assigned by the assessor as the subject property. The comparables consist of two-story dwellings of masonry or frame exterior construction that were built from 1953 to 2007. The homes range in size from 3,138 to 5,559 square feet of living area and feature basements. Each comparable has a two-car or a three-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$199,900 to \$298,970 or from \$50.19 to \$70.46 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of eleven equity comparables to support their respective positions before the Property Tax Appeal Board. The Board has given reduced weight to five of the suggested comparables presented by the parties due to differences in age and/or dwelling size when compared to the subject dwelling built in 2007 and containing 3,559 square feet; the comparables given reduced weight are appellant's comparables #2 and #4 along with board of review comparables #1, #2 and #4.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be appellant's comparables #1 and #3 along with board of review comparables #3, #5, #6 and #7. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$199,190 to \$276,680 or from \$48.68 to \$70.46 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$192,370 or \$54.05 per square foot of living area falls below the range established by the best comparables in this record

in terms of overall improvement assessment and within the range on a per-square-foot basis. After considering adjustments to the comparables for difference when compared to the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
