



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Dimas Dias, the appellant, by attorney George N. Reveliotis, of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$4,441
IMPR.: \$14,699
TOTAL: \$19,140

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1.5-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 1,989 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 64 years old. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning and a two-car garage. The property has a 3,780 square foot site and is located in Berwyn, Berwyn Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-11 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant through counsel contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales located in the same

neighborhood code as the subject property.¹ The comparables were improved with similar class 2-11 dwellings of masonry exterior construction that ranged in size from 2,030 to 2,462 square feet of living area. The dwellings range in age from 71 to 93 years old. The comparables have sites that contain either 3,780 or 3,965 square feet of land area. Each comparable has a full basement with three comparables having finished area and a two-car detached garage. The comparables sold from October 2015 to August 2017 for prices ranging from \$145,550 to \$199,500 or from \$71.70 to \$86.36 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested that the assessment be reduced to \$15,494.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$19,140. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$191,400 or \$96.23 per square foot of living area, including land, when using the level of assessment for class 2 property of 10% under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located in the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables were improved with three 2-story dwellings and one 1-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction that ranged in size from 1,752 to 2,124 square feet of living area. The dwellings range in age from 58 to 92 years old. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 3,100 to 4,883 square feet of land area. Each comparable has a full basement with two comparables having finished area and each comparable has a two-car garage. The comparables sold in either June or October 2016 for prices ranging from \$242,750 to \$271,000 or from \$120.53 to \$154.68 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted eight comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparable #3 as this property sold in October 2015, which is dated and less likely to be indicative of fair market value as of the subject's January 1, 2017 assessment date. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #2 and #3 along with the board of review comparables #3 and #4 based on these properties having a finished basement when compared to the subject. The Board did not analyze the 20 additional sales submitted by the appellant based on the limited descriptive information provided.

¹ The appellant also submitted portions of listing sheets on 20 additional sales with extremely limited descriptive information that was not included on the comparable sales/assessment grid analysis. Due to the lack of descriptive data necessary for a complete analysis, the Board has not analyzed this data.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the board of review comparable sales #1 and #2. These comparables have varying degrees of similarity in site size, bracket the subject in dwelling size and some similar features. These comparables sold for prices of \$256,000 and \$271,000 or \$120.53 and \$154.68 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$191,400 or \$96.23 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls below the best comparable sales in this record. After considering adjustments to the comparable sales for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's estimated market value as reflected by the assessment is supported. Based on this evidence the Board finds no reduction in the subject's assessment is justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
