

# FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Peter Alexopoulos, the appellant, by attorney George N. Reveliotis, of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge, and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$ 3,798 **IMPR.:** \$31,233 **TOTAL:** \$35,031

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

#### **Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

#### **Findings of Fact**

The subject consists of a two-story dwelling of frame and masonry exterior construction with 2,398 square feet of living area. The dwelling is 61 years old. Features of the home include a full basement with a formal recreation room, central air conditioning and an attached one-car garage. The property has a 5,628 square foot site and is located in Niles, Maine Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-78 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal concerning the improvement assessment. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables located in the same neighborhood code as the subject property and within .56 of a mile from the subject. The comparables consist of two-story dwellings of masonry or frame and masonry exterior construction. The dwellings range in age from 60 to 62

years old and range in size from 2,054 to 2,512 square feet of living area. Each dwelling has a full basement, three of which have formal recreation rooms. Each home has central air conditioning and a two-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$23,376 to \$29,898 or from \$10.12 to \$12.34 per square foot of living area.

Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduced improvement assessment of \$26,866 or \$11.20 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$35,031. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$31,233 or \$13.02 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables located within the same neighborhood code as the subject. Two of the comparables are within the subject's subarea and two are within ¼ of a mile of the subject. The comparables consist of two-story dwellings of frame and masonry exterior construction. The dwellings are either 60 or 62 years old and range in size from 2,301 to 2,592 square feet of living area. Three of the dwellings have full or partial unfinished basements and one comparable has a crawl-space foundation. Each home has central air conditioning and a two-car garage. One comparable has a fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$31,528 to \$35,838 or from \$13.19 to \$15.08 per square foot of living area.

Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

# **Conclusion of Law**

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of eight equity comparables with varying degrees of similarity to the subject dwelling to support their respective positions before the Property Tax Appeal Board. The comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$23,376 to \$35,838 or from \$10.12 to \$15.08 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$31,233 or \$13.02 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the comparables in this record. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences in size, foundation, finished basement and/or garage size, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

#### **IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
