



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Marek Stoch, the appellant, by attorney George N. Reveliotis, of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$3,059
IMPR.: \$18,901
TOTAL: \$21,960

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject consists of a multi-level dwelling of frame and masonry construction with 1,349 square feet square feet of living area. The dwelling is 35 years old. Features of the home include a partial basement with a formal recreation room, central air conditioning, a fireplace, and a two-car garage. The property has a 6,118 square foot site, and is located in Burbank, Stickney Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-34 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales that have the same neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 6,051 to 7,976 square feet of land area. The comparables are described as class 2-34 dwellings of frame and masonry exterior construction that range in size from 1,195 to 1,373 square feet of living area and in age from 32

to 52 years old. Each comparable has a partial basement with a formal recreation room. Two comparables have central air conditioning. Each comparable has a 1.5-car or a 2-car garage. The sales occurred from September 2015 to April 2017 for prices ranging from \$115,000 to \$185,000 or from \$83.76 to \$142.97 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$16,274, reflecting a market value of \$162,740 or \$120.64 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the level of assessment for class 2 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance of 10%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$21,960. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$219,600 or \$162.79 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the level of assessment for class 2 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance of 10%.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparables that have the same neighborhood code and classification code as the subject. Two comparables are located on the same block. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 6,118 to 7,980 square feet of land area and are improved with multi-level dwellings of frame and masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,210 to 1,401 square feet of living area and in age from 28 to 42 years old. Each property has a partial basement with a formal recreation room. One comparable has central air conditioning; one comparable has a fireplace; and each comparable has a 2-car garage. The comparables sold from May 2015 to July 2016 for prices ranging from \$199,999 to \$264,900 or from \$165.29 to \$205.92 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains eight comparable sales for the Board's consideration with varying degrees of similarity to the subject in location, dwelling size, age, and features. These comparables sold from May 2015 to April 2017 for prices ranging from \$115,000 to \$264,900 or from \$83.76 to \$205.92 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$219,600 or \$162.79 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the comparable sales in this record. Based on this evidence the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
