

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Anita Youhaneh & Hakop Goorji, the appellants, by attorney George N. Reveliotis, of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>no change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$7,560 **IMPR.:** \$22,742 **TOTAL:** \$30,302

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1-story masonry dwelling with 1,238 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 62 years old. Features of the home include a full basement with finished area, and a 2-car garage. The property has a 6,300 square foot site and is located in Chicago, Jefferson Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-03 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellants contend assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellants submitted information on four comparable properties located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables consist of 1-story or 1.5 - 1.9-story class 2-03 dwellings of frame or masonry exterior construction. The dwellings range from 62 to 92 years old and range in size from 1,077 to 1,458 square feet of living area. Three comparables have unfinished basements and central air-conditioning. One comparable has a slab

foundation. Each comparable has a 1-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$17,054 to \$23,080 or from \$14.30 to \$16.70 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested that the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$19,619 or \$15.85 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$30,302. The subject has an improvement assessment of \$22,742 or \$18.37 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four comparable properties located within the same neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables consist of similar 1-story class 2-03 dwellings of masonry exterior construction. The dwellings range from 45 to 64 years old and range in size from 1,114 to 1,238 square feet of living area. The comparables each have a full basement, one with finished area, central airconditioning, and a 1.5-car or a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$24,891 to \$26,283 or from \$20.26 to \$22.34 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayers contend assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as a basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity, and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellants did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted eight suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellants' comparables which differ from the subject in age, design, foundation type and/or garage size, and to board of review comparable #3 which is a newer dwelling when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of value in this record to be board of review comparable #1, #2 and #4 which are similar to the subject property in location, age, size, design, and most features. These comparables had improvement assessments ranging from \$24,891 to \$25,825 or from \$20.26 to \$22.34 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$22,742 or \$18.37 per square foot of living area falls below the range established by the best comparables in this record. After considering adjustments to these comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds that the appellants did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and no reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
