

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Timothy Pire, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$3,044 **IMPR.:** \$41,427 **TOTAL:** \$44,471

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a three-story multi-family dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 4,503 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 89 years old. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement and a 2-car garage. The property has a 3,690 square foot site located in Skokie, Niles View Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-11 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on three equity comparables that are located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with class 2-11 multi-family dwellings of masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 3,651 to 5,485 square feet of living area. The dwellings range

in age from 42 to 90 years old. The comparables have full basements, two of which have apartments. One comparable has central air conditioning. Two comparables have either a 2-car or a 2.5-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$15,582 to \$49,002 or from \$4.27 to \$9.05 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested that the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$33,412 or \$7.42 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$44,471. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$41,427 or \$9.20 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables which are located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with one, two-story and three, three-story multi-family buildings of masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 3,558 to 3,888 square feet of living area. The dwellings are either 86 or 87 years old. The comparables have full basements, one which has an apartment. Each comparable has a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$36,380 to \$40,143 or from \$10.22 to \$10.51 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted seven suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #2 and #3 and the board of review's comparable #3 due to their newer age, basement apartments, dissimilar design and/or lack of a basement when compared to the subject. Additionally, the Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparable #1 which appears to be an outlier due to its significantly smaller improvement assessment when compared to the subject and other comparables in this record.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the board of review's comparables #1, #2 and #4 as they are most similar to the subject in location, design, exterior construction, age, basement and most features, except each comparable is smaller in dwelling size than the subject. These comparables have improvement assessments of either \$10.32 or \$10.51 per square foot of living area. The subject property's improvement assessment of \$9.20 per square foot of living area falls below the assessments of the best comparables in this record. Furthermore, due to economies of scale, accepted real estate valuation theory provides, all other factors being equal, as the size of a property increases, its per unit value decreases. Likewise, as the size of a property decreases, its per unit value increases. Due to its larger size, the subject's estimated market value as reflected by its assessment is well supported by a preponderance of the

credible market evidence contained in this record. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
