

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Miltiades Bolaris, the appellant, by attorney George N. Reveliotis of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>no change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2017 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 3,320 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 89 years old. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, a fireplace and a 2-car garage. The property has a 17,530 square foot site and is located in Glenview, Northfield Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-06 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on seven comparables located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of frame, masonry or frame and masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 2,948 to 3,950 square feet of living area. The dwellings range

in age from 63 to 89 years old. Each comparable has a full or partial basement with two having finished area. Five comparables have central air conditioning, six comparables each have one or two fireplaces and each comparable has a 1.5-car to a 3-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$55,549 to \$76,828 or from \$18.84 to \$19.68 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$64,488 or \$19.42 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$85,835. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$67,429 or \$20.31 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparables located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of frame, masonry or frame and masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 3,039 to 3,440 square feet of living area. The dwellings are 77 and 79 years old. Three comparables have a full or partial basement with two having finished area and one comparable has a crawl space foundation. Each comparable has central air conditioning, one to three fireplaces and a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$65,650 to \$85,578 or from \$20.60 to \$24.88 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of 11 comparable properties for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #2, #3, #4, #5 and #7, along with board of review comparables #1, #3 and #4 which differ from the subject in dwelling size, age and/or foundation type.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be appellant's comparable #6 and board of review comparable #2. These comparables are relatively similar to the subject in location, design and age, though they have smaller dwellings and varying degrees of similarity in features when compared to the subject. They have improvement assessments of \$57,827 and \$65,650 or \$19.34 and \$21.60 of per square foot of living area, respectively. The subject's improvement assessment of \$67,429 or \$20.31 per square foot of living area is bracketed by the two best comparables in this record on a square foot basis. The subject's higher overall improvement assessment appears to be justified given its larger dwelling size. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences from the subject, the board finds the subject's

assessment is supported. Based on this record the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND</u> <u>EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
