

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Kenneth & Karen Stobart

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Kenneth & Karen Stobart, the appellants, by Jessica Hill-Magiera, Attorney at Law in Lake Zurich; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *no change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$70,540 **IMPR.:** \$227,764 **TOTAL:** \$298,304

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2018 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story brick dwelling with 5,270 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1994. Features of the home include a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, four fireplaces and a 1,095-square foot garage. The property has a 44,466 square foot site and is located in Lake Zurich, Cuba Township, Lake County.

The appellants' appeal is based on overvaluation. In support of this argument, the appellants submitted information on eight comparable sales of properties with varying degrees of similarity to the subject. These comparables sold from January 2017 to April 2018 for prices ranging from \$560,000 to \$875,000 or from \$107.86 to \$153.88 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$298,304. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of approximately \$901,765 or \$171.11 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2018 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.08% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In response to appellants' evidence, the board of review checked both "Market Value/Comparable Sales" and "Rollover/Prior PTAB Decision" on the page two addendum of the Board of Review – Notes on Appeal.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted a grid analysis and property record cards containing information on the subject and three comparable sales with varying degrees of similarity to the subject. The comparables sold from August 2016 to September 2018 for prices ranging from \$900,000 to \$1,000,000 or from \$179.64 to \$224.23 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on the foregoing evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellants contend the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c).

The Property Tax Appeal Board takes notice that the subject property was the matter of an appeal before the Property Tax Appeal Board for the 2017 tax year under Docket No. 17-02454.001-R-1. (See 86 Ill.Adm.Code 1910.90(i)). In that appeal, the Property Tax Appeal Board issued a decision lowering the assessment of the subject property to \$292,312.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-185) states in part:

If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel on which a residence occupied by the owner is situated, such reduced assessment, subject to equalization, shall remain in effect for the remainder of the general assessment period as provided in Sections 9-215 through 9-225, unless that parcel is subsequently sold in an arm's length transaction establishing a fair cash value for the parcel that is different from the fair cash value on which the Board's assessment is based, or unless the decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board is reversed or modified upon review.

The Board finds this record disclosed the Property Tax Appeal Board issued a decision reducing the subject's assessment for the 2017 tax year. The record further indicates that the subject property is an owner-occupied dwelling and that 2017 and 2018 are within the same general assessment period. The record contains no evidence indicating the subject property sold in an arm's length transaction after the Board's decision or that the decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board has been reversed or modified upon review. The Board also takes notice that a township

equalization factor of 1.0205 was applied in 2017 to arrive at the subject's current assessment. ($$292,312 \times 1.0205 = $298,304$). The Board finds the subject's assessment as established by the board of review for the 2018 tax year follows the dictates of Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code. For these reasons, the Property Tax Appeal Board finds that a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

Furthermore, notwithstanding the dictates of Section 16-185, the Board finds that the eleven recent comparable sales presented by the parties support the subject's current estimated market value of \$901,765 or \$171.11 per square foot of living area, land included, and thus no reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted on market value grounds.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
