

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Leo McCann DOCKET NO.: 18-02380.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 11-29-111-026

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Leo McCann, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>A Reduction</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$28,020 **IMPR.:** \$115,949 **TOTAL:** \$143,969

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2018 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 2,650 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1999. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 420 square foot garage. The property has a 6,106 square foot site and is located in Vernon Hills, Libertyville Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on five comparable sales located within 0.17 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 6,021 to 12,693 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of brick exterior construction that range in size from 2,650 to 2,784 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1997 to 2000. Each comparable has a basement, one with finished area, central air conditioning and a garage

ranging in size from 420 to 462 square feet of building area. Three comparables each have one fireplace. The comparables sold from March 2017 to January 2018 for prices ranging from \$420,000 to \$480,000 or from \$156.54 to \$181.13 per square foot of living area, land included.

The appellant's counsel submitted the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) sheet on his comparable #5 which described the property as updated and having a finished basement. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$143,969.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$150,152. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$453,906 or \$171.29 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2018 three year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.08% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located within approximately 0.16 of a mile from the subject property. Board of review comparables #1, #3 and #4 were also submitted by the appellant as comparables #4, #2 and #5, respectively. The comparables have sites that range in size from 9,850 to 12,693 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of brick exterior construction that range in size from 2,650 to 2,784 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1997 to 1999. Each comparable has a basement, one with finished area, central air conditioning and a garage ranging in size from 419 to 462 square feet of building area. Three comparables each have one fireplace. The comparables sold from March 2017 to April 2018 for prices ranging from \$435,000 to \$483,500 or from \$158.01 to \$181.13 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The record contains six comparables for the Board's consideration as three of the comparables were common to both parties. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparables #2, #4 and #5 which are the same properties as the board of review comparables #3, #1 and #4, respectively along with board of review comparable #2 which have dissimilar site sizes compared to the subject. Appellant comparable #5/board of review comparable #4 also has a finished basement, as reported in the MLS sheet, compared to the subject's unfinished basement.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be appellant's comparable sales #1 and #3 which are similar to the subject in location, age, design, site, dwelling size and basement features. They sold in June 2017 and January 2018 for prices of \$420,000 and \$442,000 or \$156.54 and \$159.74 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment

reflects a market value of \$453,906 or \$171.29 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls above the values established by the two best comparable sales in this record. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment commensurate with the request is justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
