

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Louis Eisenstein DOCKET NO.: 18-43612.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 14-31-124-005-0000

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Louis Eisenstein, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$12,316 **IMPR.:** \$59,695 **TOTAL:** \$72,011

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2018 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a three-story multi-use building of masonry exterior construction with 5,370 square feet of building area. The building is approximately 125 years old. Features of the building include a concrete slab foundation. The property has a 2,707 square foot site located in Chicago, West Chicago Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-12 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on three equity comparables that are located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with class 2-12 multi-use buildings of masonry exterior construction that range in size from 4,732 to 6,752 square feet of building area that are either 95 or 127 years old. Each comparable has an unfinished full or partial basement. Two comparables each have

central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$51,138 to \$71,355 or from \$10.57 to \$10.81 per square foot of building area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested that the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$57,298 or \$10.67 per square foot of building area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$72,011. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$59,695 or \$11.12 per square foot of building area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables which are located within the same neighborhood code, in the same block and along the same street as the subject property. However, comparable #4 is the same property as comparable #1. The comparables are improved with three-story class 2-12 multi-use buildings of masonry exterior construction that range in size from 5,220 to 5,370 square feet of building area that are either 120 or 125 years old. Each comparable has an unfinished partial basement. One comparable has central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$63,385 to \$134,804 or from \$11.84 to \$25.82 per square foot of building area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted six suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables due to their larger dwelling sizes or newer age when compared to the subject. The Board gives less weight to the board of review comparable #2 which is an outlier with a significantly higher improvement assessment than the other comparables in the record.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the board of review's comparables #1 and #3 which are similar to the subject in age, building size and some features, except each comparable has a basement which is not a feature of the subject. Nevertheless, these comparables have improvement assessments of \$63,385 and \$65,384 or \$11.84 and \$12.18 per square foot of living area respectively. The subject's improvement assessment of \$59,695 or \$11.12 per square foot of living area falls below the assessments of the two best comparables in the record. After considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment based on inequity is not warranted.

The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

Date:

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
