



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Martina Rodriguez, the appellant, by attorney George N. Reveliotis, of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge, and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$2,998  
**IMPR.:** \$20,038  
**TOTAL:** \$23,036

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2018 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of frame and masonry exterior construction with 2,572 square feet of living area. The dwelling was 16 years old. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace, and a 3-car garage. The property has an 8,568 square foot site and is located in Lansing, Thornton Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-78 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales that have the same neighborhood code as the subject. The appellant reported in Section V of the comparable sales grid that the comparables have sites ranging in size from 3,000 to 7,370 square feet of land area but reported in an additional comparable sales analysis spreadsheet that the comparables have sites ranging in

size from 8,460 to 11,094 square feet of land area. The properties are each improved with a class 2-78 dwelling of frame or frame and masonry exterior construction with 2,572 square feet of living area and is 16 years old. The comparables have full basements, with one having a recreation room. Each comparable has central air conditioning, a fireplace, and a 2-car or a 3-car garage. The sales occurred from March 2016 to June 2017 for prices ranging from \$200,000 to \$224,000 or from \$80.29 to \$87.83 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$23,036. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$230,036 or \$89.44 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the 10% level of assessment for class 2-78 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance. In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales two of which have the same neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables have sites that range in size from 8,614 to 30,000 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of frame exterior construction that range in size from 2,036 to 2,688 square feet of living area and range in from 16 to 30 years old. The comparables have partial or full unfinished basements, three comparables have central air conditioning, and each comparable has a fireplace and a 2-car garage. The sales occurred from May to November 2018 for prices ranging from \$229,900 to \$257,500 or from \$95.80 to \$112.92 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains eight comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparables #1 and #4 as each sale occurred at least 19 months prior to the January 1, 2017 assessment date and were less likely to be reflective of the subject's market value. The Board also gave less weight to board of review comparables #2, #3 and #4 as they are less similar in age when compared to the subject. The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appellant's comparables #2 and #3 along with board of review comparable #1 which sold proximate in time to the assessment date at issue and are similar to the subject property in location, age, dwelling size and some features. These comparables sold for prices ranging from \$200,000 to \$249,000 or from \$87.09 to \$100.44 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$230,036 or \$89.44 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. After considering adjustments to the best comparable sales for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's estimated market value as reflected by the assessment is supported and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
