



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: David McLaughlin

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are David McLaughlin, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$65,753
IMPR.: \$108,232
TOTAL: \$173,985

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 2,612 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1969. Features of the home include a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 506 square foot garage. The property has a 20,040 square foot site and is located in Lincolnshire, Vernon Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on six comparable sales located within 0.58 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 19,602 to 22,651 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of frame or brick and frame exterior construction that range in size from 2,556 to 2,652 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1965 to 1971. Each comparable has a basement, five with finished area, central

air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 462 to 529 square feet of building area. The properties sold from October 2018 to August 2019 for prices ranging from \$366,500 to \$605,000 or from \$142.05 to \$235.87 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$148,869 which reflects a market value of \$446,652 or \$171.00 per square foot of living area, land included, when applying the statutory assessment level of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$173,985. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$528,991 or \$202.52 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales located within 0.76 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 19,600 to 21,340 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of brick exterior construction that range in size from 2,565 to 2,812 square feet of living area. The homes were built in 1969 or 1977. Each comparable has a basement, four with finished area, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 484 to 1,104 square feet of building area. The properties sold from March 2018 to March 2019 for prices ranging from \$530,000 to \$610,000 or from \$199.85 to \$235.87 per square foot of living area, land included.

The board of review also submitted the Multiple Listing Service sheet for the appellant's comparable #1 describing the property as being sold in "as is" condition and having "very motivated sellers." Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains nine comparable sales for the Board's consideration, as two comparables were common to both parties. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparable #1 which was sold in "as is" condition with motivated sellers, suggesting the property's condition is below market expectations. The Board gives reduced weight to the appellant's comparable #2, which is also the board of review comparable #4 along with board of review comparables #4 and #5 which differ from the subject in their unfinished basement, newer age and/or garage size.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the remaining comparables which are more similar to the subject in location, age, design, dwelling size and features. These comparables sold from March 2018 to August 2019 for prices ranging from \$430,000 to

\$550,000 or from \$168.23 to \$202.28 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$528,991 or \$202.52 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record on an overall basis and just above on a per square foot basis. Given the subject's dwelling size and site size, a slightly higher per square foot value appears to be justified. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
