

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Anthony Vastardis DOCKET NO.: 19-04541.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 16-04-309-015

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Anthony Vastardis, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *no change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$93,267 **IMPR.:** \$228,701 **TOTAL:** \$321,968

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 3,864 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1988. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning, three fireplaces and a 690 square foot garage. The property is located in Lake Forest, West Deerfield Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on seven comparable properties. The appellant failed to provide sales data for comparable #7, therefore, it will not be further addressed in this analysis. The six comparable sales are improved with two-story dwellings of brick, wood siding or brick and wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 3,134 to 4,509 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1983 to 1988. One comparable has a concrete slab foundation

and five comparables each have a basement, two of which have recreation rooms.¹ Each comparable has central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage that ranges in size from 630 to 816 square feet of building area. These properties sold from April 2018 to August 2019 for prices ranging from \$658,125 to \$950,000 or from \$188.92 to \$250.35 per square foot of living area, including land. Counsel for the appellant noted differences between the comparables and the subject. Counsel also noted that "The Ponds" has uniformity in its land market value. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$282,354, which would reflect a market value of \$847,147 or \$219.24 per square foot of living area, including land, when using the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$321,968. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$978,924 or \$253.34 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located within the same neighborhood as the subject. The board of review comparables #2 and #4 are duplicates of the appellant's comparables #6 and #2, respectively, which were previously described. The board of review's comparables #1 and #3 are improved with two-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction with 3,308 and 3,020 square feet of living area that were built in 1985 and 1984, respectively. The comparables each have an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage with either 483 or 552 square feet of building area. These properties sold in March and August 2018 for prices of \$807,000 and \$900,000 or for \$267.22 and \$272.07 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains a total of eight suggested comparable sales for the Board's consideration, as two sales were common to both parties. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #2, #3 and #4, as well as board of review comparables #3 and #4, which includes one common comparable, due to their dissimilar dwelling sizes when compared to the subject. The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the parties' remaining comparables which are similar to the subject in location, dwelling size, design, age and some features. The

¹ The appellant provided MLS listing sheets associated with the sales of comparables #3 and #4, which disclosed comparable #3 has an unfinished basement and comparable #4 has a basement that is partially finished with a recreation room.

Board finds each dwelling is slightly older than the subject and three of the four comparables have somewhat smaller dwelling sizes when compared to the subject. The comparables sold from April to August 2018 for prices ranging from \$730,000 to \$900,000 or from \$188.92 to \$272.07 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$978,924 or \$253.34 per square foot of living area, including land, which is above the range established by the best comparable sales in the record in terms of overall market value but within the range on a price per square foot basis. However, after considering adjustments to the comparables for differences in age, dwelling size and other features when compared to the subject, the Board finds no reduction in the subject's estimated market value as reflected by its assessment is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
