



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: William Roberts

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are William Roberts, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest, and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$38,918
IMPR.: \$105,012
TOTAL: \$143,930

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property is improved with a one-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 2,841 square feet of living area. The dwelling was built in 1994. Features of the home include a full basement with a recreation room, central air conditioning, one fireplace, and an attached garage with 851 square feet of building area. The property has a 98,290 square foot site and is located in Mundelein, Fremont Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on three comparable sales improved with 1.5-story or 2-story dwellings of brick or brick and wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 3,495 to 6,062 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1957 to 2006. Each comparable has a basement with two being finished with recreation rooms. Each property has central air conditioning, one fireplace and an attached garage ranging in size from 842 to 1,878 square feet

of building area. Comparable #3 has an inground swimming pool. Each comparable has a different assessment neighborhood code than the subject property and a site with either 40,080 or 82,590 square feet of land area. The sales occurred from December 2017 to April 2018 for prices ranging from \$430,000 to \$775,000 or from \$105.74 to \$127.85 per square foot of living area, including land. The appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$134,305.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$143,930. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$437,610 or \$154.03 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on three comparable sales improved with two-story dwellings with vinyl siding or wood siding exteriors that range in size from 2,592 to 3,498 square feet of living area. The homes were built in 1994 and 1995. Each property has a full basement with two having recreation rooms, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces, and an attached garage with either 609 or 876 square feet of building area. The comparables are located in the same neighborhood as the subject with sites ranging in size from 47,080 to 57,260 square feet of land area. These properties sold from May 2016 to May 2017 for prices ranging from \$389,950 to \$495,000 or from \$131.21 to \$183.26 per square foot of living area, including land. The board of review requested the assessment be sustained.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains six sales presented by the parties to support their respective positions. None of the comparables are improved with homes that are similar to the subject dwelling in design as each is a 1.5-story or 2-story dwelling while the subject property is improved with a 1-story home. Nevertheless, the Board gives less weight to appellant's comparables due to differences from the subject property in location, dwelling size and/or age. Even though the sales did not occur particularly proximate in time to the assessment date, the Board gives most weight to the board of review comparables as they are more similar to the subject property in location, dwelling size and age than are the comparables provided by the appellant. These three comparables sold for prices ranging from \$389,950 to \$495,000 or from \$131.21 to \$183.26 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$437,610 or \$154.03 per square foot of living area, including land, which is within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. Based on this evidence the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
