



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Sylvia Carey, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest, and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$75,399  
**IMPR.:** \$66,944  
**TOTAL:** \$142,343

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a one-story dwelling of brick construction with 1,785 square feet of living area. The dwelling was built in 1964. Features of the home include a partial basement with a recreation room, central air conditioning, two fireplaces and an attached garage with 546 square feet of building area. The property has a 10,400 square foot site and is located in Lake Bluff, Shields Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales improved with one-story dwellings of brick or wood siding and brick exterior construction ranging in size from 1,515 to 2,044 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1957 to 1963. Each comparable has a partial basement with three being finished with recreation rooms. Each property has central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and an attached garage ranging in size from 420 to 550

square feet of building area. The comparables are located in the same neighborhood as the subject property with sites ranging in size from 10,950 to 12,890 square feet of land area. The sales occurred from January 2018 to June 2018 for prices ranging from \$335,000 to \$423,000 or from \$206.95 to \$253.23 per square foot of living area, including land. The appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$125,532.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$142,343. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$432,785 or \$242.46 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales improved with one-story dwellings of brick exterior construction ranging in size from 1,623 to 2,002 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1956 to 1963. Each comparable has a partial basement with two being finished with recreation rooms. Each property has central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and an attached or detached garage ranging in size from 418 to 484 square feet of building area. The comparables are located in the same neighborhood as the subject property with sites ranging in size from 10,400 to 12,480 square feet of land area. The sales occurred from June 2018 to August 2019 for prices ranging from \$411,000 to \$540,000 or from \$253.23 to \$305.47 per square foot of living area, including land. Board of review comparable #4 is the same property as appellant's comparable #4.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains seven sales presented by the parties to support their respective positions with one property being common to both parties. The comparables are similar to the subject in location, style, age, features and land area. These properties sold from January 2018 to August 2019 for prices ranging from \$335,000 to \$540,000 or from \$206.95 to \$305.47 per square foot of living area, including land. The common sale sold in June 2018 for a price of \$411,000 or \$253.23 per square foot of living area, land included. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$432,785 or \$242.46 per square foot of living area, including land, which is within the range established by the comparable sales in this record, and well supported by the common comparable. Based on this evidence the Board finds the assessment of the subject property as established by the board of review is correct and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
