



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Doug Cayce

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Doug Cayce, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$130,209
IMPR.: \$371,720
TOTAL: \$501,929

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling with wood siding and brick exterior construction containing 5,498 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2005. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, three fireplaces and an attached 828 square foot garage. The property is located in Libertyville, Libertyville Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on six comparable sales that are located from .24 of a mile to 1.74 miles from the subject, with comparables #4 and #6 located within the same neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 10,625 to 62,402 square feet of land area that are improved with two-story dwellings containing from 3,684 to 5,280 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1989 to 2007. The comparables have

unfinished basements, central air conditioning and three or four fireplaces. The comparables have attached and/or detached garages ranging in total size from 648 to 1,222 square feet of building area. Two comparables each have a swimming pool. The comparables sold from June 2018 to July 2019 for prices ranging from \$611,000 to \$1,340,000 or from \$136.57 to \$371.88 per square foot of living area, including land. The appellant's submission included a brief noting the differences in features of the appellant's comparables, when compared to the subject.

Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$501,929. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$1,526,084 or \$277.57 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales that are located from .24 of a mile to 1.09 miles from the subject, with comparables #1 and #2 located within the same neighborhood code as the subject. The board of review's comparables #2 and #5 are the same properties as the appellant's comparables #6 and #5, respectively. However, the parties reported a different dwelling size, neither of which was supported by evidence, for their common comparable appellant #6 and board of review #2. One of the board of review's comparables has a 32,030 square foot site and each comparable is improved with a one-story or a two-story dwelling containing from 3,886 to 4,947 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2002 to 2015. The comparables have unfinished basements, central air conditioning and from one to three fireplaces. The comparables have attached or detached garages ranging in size from 501 to 1,074 square feet of building area. One comparable has a swimming pool. The comparables sold from April 2018 to April 2019 for prices ranging from \$1,125,000 to \$1,370,000 or from \$245.10 to \$352.55 per square foot of living area, including land.

Based on this evidence the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains a total of nine comparable sales for the Board's consideration, two of which were submitted by both parties. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #2 and #3, as well as the board of review's comparable #1, due to their differences in age, when compared to the subject. The Board also gives less weight to the parties' common comparable, appellant #6 and board of review #2, due to their reported differences in size, neither of which was supported by evidence. The Board finds the parties' remaining comparables, which includes

one of the parties' common comparables, have varying degrees of similarity to the subject however, each of the parties' best comparables have a significantly smaller dwelling than the subject. Nevertheless, the parties' best comparables sold for prices ranging from \$962,500 to \$1,370,000 or from \$192.92 to \$304.96 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$1,526,084 or \$277.57 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls above the range established by the best comparable sales in the record on a total market value basis but within the range on a per square foot basis. However, after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, such as their significantly smaller dwelling size, the Board finds the subject's higher total market value as reflected by its assessment is supported. Based on this evidence, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
