



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Jonathan Stueck

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Jonathan Stueck, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$17,964  
**IMPR.:** \$77,028  
**TOTAL:** \$94,992

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a one-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 2,200 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2006. Features of the home include a full unfinished basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace, and an attached 420 square foot garage. The property has an 8,680 square foot site and is located in Antioch, Antioch Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales that are located from .05 to .15 of a mile from the subject. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 8,280 to 15,600 square feet of land area that are improved with one-story or two-story dwellings with wood siding or brick exterior construction containing from 2,099 to 2,423 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1994 to 2005. The comparables have full basements, each of which

with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and an attached garage ranging in size from 528 to 849 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from November 2017 to June 2019 for prices ranging from \$250,000 to \$325,000 or from \$119.10 to \$134.13 per square foot of living area, including land. The appellant's submission included a brief noting superior features of the appellant's comparables, when compared to the subject. The appellant also submitted Multiple Listing Service (MLS) data for the appellant's comparable #4, revealing the property has a finished basement and was rehabbed in 2010 prior to its November 2017 sale.

Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$94,992. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$288,817 or \$131.28 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales that are located from .04 to .15 of a mile from the subject. The board of review's comparables #2, #3 and #4, are the same properties as the appellant's comparables #1, #2 and #3. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 8,280 to 10,020 square feet of land area that are improved with one-story or two-story dwellings with wood siding or brick exterior construction containing from 2,008 to 2,257 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1991 to 2005. The comparables have full basements, three of which with finished area, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and an attached garage ranging in size from 528 to 696 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from October 2018 to June 2019 for prices ranging from \$130,000 to \$294,500 or from \$64.74 to \$130.48 per square foot of living area, including land.

Based on this evidence the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains a total of five comparable sales for the Board's consideration, three of which were submitted by both parties. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparable #4 due to its sale occurring greater than 13 months prior to the January 1, 2019 assessment date at issue. The Board finds the parties' remaining comparables, which includes the parties' common comparables, are similar to the subject in location, size and some features. However, each of the parties' best comparables is older than the subject and three are dissimilar two-story dwellings which have finished basement area, unlike the subject. Nevertheless, the best comparables sold from October 2018 to June 2019 for prices ranging from \$130,000 to \$294,500 or from \$64.74 to

\$130.48 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$288,817 or \$131.28 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in the record on a total market value basis but slightly above the range on a per square foot basis. However, after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, such as their older age, the Board finds the subject's slightly higher per square foot market value as reflected by its assessment is supported. Based on this record the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
