

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Maynard Rowe DOCKET NO.: 19-06828.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 10-22-305-023

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Maynard Rowe, the appellant, by attorney Andrew J. Rukavina of The Tax Appeal Company in Mundelein; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>no change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$37,363 **IMPR.:** \$112,850 **TOTAL:** \$150,213

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a one-story dwelling of vinyl siding and stone exterior construction with 2,759 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2007. Features of the home include a concrete slab foundation, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 660 square foot garage. The property has a 10,060 square foot site and is located in Mundelein, Fremont Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales located from .59 to 1.90 miles from the subject property, three of which are within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables have sites that range in size from 6,270 to 8,050 square feet of land area and are improved with one-story dwellings of vinyl siding or brick and vinyl siding exterior construction ranging in size from 1,911 to 2,664 square feet of living area. The dwellings were

built from 2007 to 2010. One comparable has a basement with finished area and three comparables have concrete slab foundations. Each comparable has central air conditioning and a garage with 400 or 540 square feet of building area. One comparable has a fireplace. The properties sold from May 2017 to December 2019 for prices ranging from \$335,000 to \$409,500 or from \$126.32 to \$152.78 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's assessment be reduced to \$131,568, which would reflect a market value of \$394,743 or \$143.07 per square foot of living area, including land, when using the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$150,213. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$456,713 or \$165.54 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located in Mundelein and within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables have sites that range in size from 9,000 to 9,900 square feet of land area and are improved with one-story dwellings of vinyl siding, vinyl siding and brick or vinyl siding and stone exterior construction ranging in size from 2,645 to 3,103 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2007 to 2010. Each comparable has a concrete slab foundation, central air conditioning and a garage ranging in size from 460 to 660 square feet of building area. Two comparables each have a fireplace. The properties sold from June 2018 to March 2019 for prices ranging from \$450,000 to \$499,000 or from \$160.81 to \$179.58 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains a total of eight suggested comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables #2 and #3 due to their sales occurring in 2017, which are dated and less likely to be indicative of the subject's market value as of the January 1, 2019 assessment date. The Board also gives less weight to the appellant's comparable #4 due to its smaller dwelling size and dissimilar basement foundation when compared to the subject dwelling.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appellant's comparable sale #1, along with the comparable sales provided by the board of review. These comparables sold proximate in time to the assessment date at issue and are relatively similar to the subject in location, dwelling size, design, age and most features. The properties sold from June 2018 to

July 2019 for prices ranging from \$335,000 to \$499,000 or from \$126.32 to \$179.58 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$456,713 or \$165.54 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in the record both in terms of overall market value and on a price per square foot basis. Based on this record and after considering adjustments to the comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds no reduction in the subject's estimated market value as reflected by its assessment is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
