

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Mohammad Roshandel DOCKET NO.: 19-08570.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 14-21-204-013

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Mohammad Roshandel, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$17,528 **IMPR.:** \$74,873 **TOTAL:** \$92,401

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a one-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 1,231 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1971 and is 48 years old. Features of the home include a finished lower level, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 504 square foot garage. The property has an approximately 11,900 square foot site and is located in Lake Zurich, Ela Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity, with respect to the improvement assessment, as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables located in the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and within 0.41 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with one-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction with either 1,216 or 1,231 square feet of living area. Each of the comparables are 49 years old and have a finished lower level, central air

conditioning and a garage with either 260 or 262 square feet of building area. One comparable has a fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$67,852 to \$69,896 or from \$55.12 to \$57.00 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$69,425 or \$56.40 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$92,401. The subject has an improvement assessment of \$74,873 or \$60.82 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on five equity comparables located in the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and within 0.44 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with one-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction that each have 1,231 square feet of living area and were built 1971. Each comparable has a finished lower level, central air conditioning and a 504 square foot garage. Four comparables have either one or two fireplaces. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$75,018 to \$82,427 or from \$60.94 to \$66.96 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments, for the assessment year in question, of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted nine equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board finds both parties' comparables are similar to the subject in location, age, design and dwelling size. However, the appellant's comparables each have a smaller garage when compared to the subject, suggesting an upward adjustment is needed to make these comparables more equivalent to the subject property. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$67,852 to \$82,427 or from \$55.12 to \$66.96 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$74,873 or \$60.82 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the comparables in this record. After considering appropriate adjustments to the comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
