



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Jaclyn Lieneck, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$14,570
IMPR.: \$80,317
TOTAL: \$94,887

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of vinyl siding exterior construction with 2,264 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1993 and is approximately 26 years old and has an effective age of 1996. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning and an attached garage with 420 square feet of building area. The property has a site with approximately 10,080 square feet of land area and is located in Grayslake, Avon Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four suggested equity comparables located within 0.42 of a mile from the subject and within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of vinyl siding exterior construction that range in size from 2,335 to 2,658 square feet of living area. The dwellings are either 27 or 28 years old. Each comparable has central air conditioning and an attached garage ranging in size from 412 to 483 square feet of building area. Two comparables have an unfinished basement and two comparables have either a crawlspace or a concrete slab foundation. One comparable has a fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from

\$72,326 to \$85,710 or from \$30.36 to \$32.42 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$71,316 or \$31.50 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$94,887. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$80,317 or \$35.48 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted the subject's property record card and a grid analysis of five suggested equity comparables located within 0.26 of a mile from the subject and within the same assessment neighborhood as the subject property. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of vinyl siding exterior construction that range in size from 2,044 to 2,442 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1991 to 1995.¹ Each comparable has a basement with four comparables having finished area, central air conditioning, one fireplace and an attached garage ranging in size from 400 to 483 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$81,519 to \$90,479 or from \$34.75 to \$39.88 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted nine suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparables #1 and #2 along with the board of review comparables #1, #2, #3 and #5 for their lack of basements and/or their basement finished areas when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity are the appellant's comparables #3 and #4 along with the board of review comparable #4 as these comparables are similar when compared to the subject in age and some features. These comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$77,798 to \$85,956 or from \$32.25 to \$35.20 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$80,317 or \$35.48 per square feet falls within the range established by the most similar assessment comparables contained in the record on an overall basis and slightly above the range on a per square foot basis range established by the best comparables in the record. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is supported. Based on this evidence the Board finds no reduction in the subject's assessment is justified.

¹ Comparables #3 and #5 were built in 1991 and 1994 with an effective age of 1994 and 1996, respectively.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
