



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Ajay Gupta, the appellant by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago, and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$20,088
IMPR.: \$75,837
TOTAL: \$95,925

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of vinyl siding exterior construction with 2,069 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1995 and is 24 years old. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, one fireplace and a 400 square foot garage. The property has a 9,147 square foot site and is located in Mundelein, Fremont Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales located within .33 miles from the subject. The comparables have sites that range in size from 6,969 to 8,712 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of vinyl siding exterior construction that are 22 to 25 years old. The dwellings range in size from 2,032 to 2,532 square feet of living area. Each comparable has a basement with one having finished area, central air conditioning, one fireplace,

and a garage ranging in size from 420 to 504 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from April 2017 to June 2018 for prices ranging from \$232,500 to \$305,000 or from \$111.37 to \$121.47 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$95,925. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$291,654 or \$140.96 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2019 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 32.89% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales located within .42 miles from the subject. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 6,970 to 9,150 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of vinyl siding exterior construction that were built from 1994 to 1997. The dwellings range in size from 2,047 to 2,069 square feet of living area. Each comparable has a basement with four having a recreation room, central air conditioning, and a garage with 400 square feet of building area. Four comparables each have one fireplace. The comparables sold from June 2018 to September 2019 for prices ranging from \$320,000 to \$338,000 or from \$155.57 to \$163.36 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains nine suggested comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables due to their larger dwelling sizes and/or dated sales in 2017, which are less likely to be reflective of market value as of the subject's January 1, 2019 assessment date.

The Board finds the best evidence of the subject's market value to be the board of review comparables which sold proximate in time to the assessment date and are more similar to the subject in location, age, dwelling size and features. However, four comparables each have a recreation in the basement unlike the subject, suggesting a downward adjustment to make them more equivalent to the subject. The comparables sold from June 2018 to September 2019 for prices ranging from \$320,000 to \$338,000 or from \$155.57 to \$163.36 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$291,654 or \$140.96 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls below the range established by the best comparable sales in the record. Based on this evidence and after considering adjustments to the best comparable sales for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the appellant failed to prove by a preponderance of the evidence that a reduction in the subject's assessment is justified based on overvaluation.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
