



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: John Seely

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are John Seely, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago, and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$75,399
IMPR.: \$116,602
TOTAL: \$192,001

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 2,376 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1976 and is 43 years old. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 480 square foot garage. The property has a 10,400 square foot site and is located in Lake Bluff, Shields Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four suggested equity comparables with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables were improved with two-story dwellings of brick exterior construction that range in size from 2,208 to 2,423 square feet of living area and are 57 or 58 years old. All comparables have a basement, one of which has finished area. Three comparables have central air

conditioning. Two comparables each have a fireplace. Each comparable has a garage that ranges in size from 420 to 528 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$93,230 to \$102,852 or from \$41.12 to \$42.52 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$192,001. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$116,602 or \$49.07 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five suggested equity comparables with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables were improved with two-story dwellings of brick or wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 2,232 to 2,398 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1967 to 1985. All comparables have basements, four of which have finished area. Each comparable has central air conditioning and a garage that ranges in size from 462 to 672 square feet of building area. Four comparables each have a fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$116,315 to \$120,704 or from \$48.93 to \$54.08 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted nine suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables which are older dwellings when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the board of review comparables. These comparables are more similar in location, style, dwelling size, age and most features when compared to the subject property. However, the Board recognizes four comparables have basement recreation rooms unlike the subject which suggest downward adjustments to make them more equivalent to the subject. These comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$116,315 to \$120,704 or from \$48.93 to \$54.08 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$116,602 or \$49.07 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record and is well supported by board of review comparable sale #4, the most similar sale in the record with an unfinished basement. Based on this record the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
