

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: David Cerra

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are David Cerra, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *no change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$114,676 **IMPR.:** \$139,535 **TOTAL:** \$254,211

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a three-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 3,668 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1923 and is approximately 96 years old. The dwelling has a reported effective age of 1944. Features of the home include a basement finished with a recreation room, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 480 square foot garage. The property has a 15,690 square foot site and is located in Highland Park, Moraine Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within .86

of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with three-story dwellings of wood siding or stucco exterior construction ranging in size from 3,062 to 4,546 square feet of living area. The dwellings range in age from 95 to 138 years old. The comparables each have a basement, one of which has finished area. Each comparable has central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 216 to 1,040 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$104,388 to \$137,334 or from \$29.54 to \$35.94 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$116,459 or \$31.75 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$254,211. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$139,535 or \$38.04 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on five equity comparables with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within .33 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with two and one half-story or three-story dwellings of brick, stucco or wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 3,354 to 3,948 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1923 to 1936 and have reported effective ages ranging from 1943 to 1953. The board of review reported that each comparable has a basement, four of which are finished with a recreation room. Four comparables have central air conditioning and a garage ranging in size from 441 to 660 square feet of building area. Each comparable has a fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$135,198 to \$171,465 or from \$38.30 to \$43.95 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains a total of nine suggested equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables due to their dissimilar dwelling sizes and/or unfinished basements when compared to the subject. The Board has given less weight to board of review comparable #2 due to its lack of central air conditioning, a basement recreation room and a garage, all features of the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be board of review comparables #1, #3, #4 and #5, which are overall more similar to the subject in location, dwelling size, design, age and most features. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$146,463 to \$171,465 or from \$38.30 to \$43.95 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$139,535 or \$38.04 per square foot of living area falls below the

range established by the best comparables in the record both in terms of overall improvement assessment and on a square foot basis. Therefore, based on this record and after considering adjustments to the comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
