



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Frederick Sierles, the appellant(s), by attorney Noah J. Schmidt, of Schmidt Salzman & Moran, Ltd. in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$8,662
IMPR.: \$50,076
TOTAL: \$58,738

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

Appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property is improved with a single-family, one-story dwelling of frame-and-masonry construction containing 2,966 square feet of living area. As of the instant lien date the subject was 47 years old. Features of the home include a full formal recreation room basement, central air conditioning, and a 2.5-car garage. The subject has a 7,372 square foot site and is in Glenview, Northfield Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-04 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

Appellant's appeal is based on assessment equity, and Appellant submitted information on five suggested comparable one-story dwellings. One is frame-and-masonry construction, one is frame, and two are masonry. All have air conditioning. As of the lien date, Appellant's comparables ages range from 31 to 73 years old. Appellant's comparables range in size from 2,675 square feet to 3,106 square feet of living area and improvement assessments from \$9.32 to

\$14.71 per square foot of living area. Each comparable has the same neighborhood code as the subject property, with no further evidence on proximity to subject.

The Cook County Board of Review (BOR) submitted its “Board of Review Notes on Appeal” wherein the subject’s final assessment of \$58,738 was disclosed. The subject has a total improvement assessment of \$50,076 or \$16.88 per square foot of living area.

The BOR submitted four equity comparables in support of its final assessment. The properties are described as one-story dwellings, with one located on the same block as the subject, one within a quarter mile of the subject, and two in the same subarea as the subject. All four BOR comparables share the same neighborhood code as the subject. Three are frame-and-masonry construction; one is masonry. All have air conditioning. As of the lien date the BOR comparables range from 42 to 47 years old. The comparables range from 2,180 to 2,498 square feet of building area and have improvement assessments from \$16.68 to \$18.85 per square foot of building area.

Conclusions of Law

Appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal.

As a preliminary matter, Appellant also checked “Contention of Law” on the petition. However, Appellant only submitted argument and evidence that the subject property was inequitably assessed. Appellant’s petition lacks any other substantive legal argument. “If contentions of law are raised, the contesting party shall submit a brief in support of his position with the petition.” PTAB Rules §1910.30(h). Therefore, the Board will proceed on the basis of the evidence presented.

When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill. Admin. Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill. Admin. Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds Appellant *did not meet* this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment *is not warranted*.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be BOR comparables 1 and 2 and Appellant comparables 3 and 4. They are all within 562 square feet of the subject’s size, and Appellant comparable 4 is only three square feet smaller than the subject. The two BOR comparables are frame-and-masonry construction, same as the subject. Appellant comparable 3 is masonry construction, and Appellant comparable 4 is frame. The Board also takes note that BOR comparable 2 is on the same block as the subject, and BOR comparable 1 is within a quarter mile of the subject. Appellant did not disclose the presented comparables’ proximities to the subject.

These comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$12.89 to \$17.26 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$16.88 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record.

Based on this record, the Board finds Appellant *did not* demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment *is not* justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
