



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Jeffrey Wong, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a multi-level dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 1,250 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 47 years old. Features of the home include a partial basement with finished area, central air conditioning and a two-car garage. The property has a 5,148 square foot site located in Country Club Hills, Rich Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-34 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables that are located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with class 2-34 dwellings of frame and masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,090 to 2,032 square feet of living area and are either 45 or 57 years old.

Each comparable has a partial basement with finished area and a two-car garage. Three comparables each have central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$6,568 to \$11,609 or from \$5.71 to \$6.03 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested that the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$7,250 or \$5.80 per square foot of living area.

The appellant submitted a copy of the final decision of the Cook County Board of Review dated April 21, 2020 for the 2019 assessment year concerning the two parcels which depicts assessments of \$5,880 for Parcel #1 (PIN 31-03-311-025-0000) and \$5,885 for Parcel #2 (PIN 31-03-311-024-0000). The subject's two parcels have a combined total assessment of \$11,765 and a total improvement assessment of \$9,196 or \$7.36 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" providing assessment information on only one parcel under appeal. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables that are located within the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with multi-level class 2-34 dwellings of frame or frame and masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,174 to 1,252 square feet of living area and in age from 32 to 51 years old. Each comparable has a partial basement with finished area and a one-car or a two-car garage. One comparable has central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$8,727 to \$9,999 or from \$7.43 to \$8.12 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted eight suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #2 and #4 due to their dissimilar dwelling sizes when compared to the subject. The Board finds the best of evidence of assessment equity to be the parties' six remaining comparables as they are similar to the subject in age, dwelling size and features. However, four comparables lack central air conditioning which is a feature of the subject. Nevertheless, these comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$6,624 to \$9,999 or from \$5.71 to \$8.12 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$9,196 or \$7.36 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record. After considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
