

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Richard Cobbins, the appellant, by attorney Peter D. Verros of Verros Berkshire in Oakbrook Terrace; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>no change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2019 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story multi-family dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 2,352 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 57 years old. Features of the home include a concrete slab foundation and a 2-car garage. The property has a 5,250 square foot site and is located in East Hazel Crest, Thornton Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-11 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables located in Harvey or South Holland and from 2.7 to 5.0 miles from the subject property. The comparables are improved with class 2-11, one-story or two-story multi-family dwellings of masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 2,296 to 2,542 square feet of

living area. The dwellings range in age from 59 to 127 years old. One comparable has a concrete slab foundation and three comparables each have an unfinished basement. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$6,532 to \$8,602 or from \$2.77 to \$3.38 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$7,315 or \$3.11 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$16,618. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$14,912 or \$6.34 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables located on the same block and within the same city as the subject property, each with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables are improved with class 2-11, two-story multi-family dwellings of masonry exterior construction, each with 2,352 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built in 1956 or 1957. The comparables each have a concrete slab foundation and two comparables each have a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$14,912 to \$14,957 or for \$6.34 and \$6.36 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains eight suggested equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables due to their distant locations from the subject being more than 2 miles away, none of which are within the same city as the subject. Furthermore, three of the appellant's comparables have considerably older dwellings with basements, when compared the subject dwelling that has a concrete slab foundation.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be comparables submitted by the board of review. These comparables are identical to the subject in dwelling size and design, and similar to the subject in location, design, age, and some features. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$14,912 to \$14,957 or for \$6.34 and \$6.36 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$14,912 or \$6.34 per square foot of living area appears to be well supported by the best comparables in this record. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND</u> <u>EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
