



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Pamela Warland

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Pamela Warland, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$7,211
IMPR.: \$62,781
TOTAL: \$69,992

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2020 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story townhome of wood frame construction with 1,599 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2004. Features of the home include a partially finished basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace and an attached 462 square foot garage. The property has a 5,300 square foot site and is located in Antioch, Antioch Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on five comparable sales that are located from .06 to .11 of a mile from the subject. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 2,993 to 7,044 square feet of land area that are improved with two-story townhomes containing 1,599 or 1,755 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2003 to 2006. The comparables have basements, two of which have finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 462 square

foot garage. The comparables sold from March 2019 to April 2020 for prices ranging from \$191,000 to \$220,000 or from \$108.83 to \$131.33 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$69,992. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$210,249 or \$131.49 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2020 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.29% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales that are located from .01 to .09 of a mile from the subject. The board of review's comparables #3 and #5 are the same properties as the appellant's comparables #4 and #3, respectively. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 3,020 to 7,470 square feet of land area that are improved with one-story or two-story townhomes containing from 1,639 to 1,836 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2003 to 2007. The comparables have basements, four of which have finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a garage ranging in size from 420 to 462 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from February to December 2019 for prices ranging from \$218,000 to \$265,000 or from \$124.22 to \$161.68 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of eight comparable sales for the Board's consideration, two of which were submitted by both parties. The Board gives less weight to the board of review's comparables #2 and #4, due to their dissimilar one-story style when compared to the subject. The Board finds the parties' remaining comparables, which includes the parties' common comparables, have varying degrees of similarity to the subject; however, three of the parties' best comparables lack finished basement area, unlike the subject. Nevertheless, the parties' best comparables sold for prices ranging from \$191,000 to \$228,000 or from \$108.83 to \$131.33 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$210,249 or \$131.49 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in the record on a total market value basis but slightly above the range on a per square foot basis. However, after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, such as their lack of finished basement area, the Board finds the subject's higher per square foot market value as reflected by its assessment is justified. Based on this evidence, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
