

# FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Mark Suri

DOCKET NO.: 20-01348.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 16-28-317-014

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Mark Suri, the appellant, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld and Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$76,763 **IMPR.:** \$151,000 **TOTAL:** \$227,763

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

## **Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2020 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

#### **Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of brick and wood siding exterior construction with 3,020 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1925 and is approximately 95 years old. Features of the home include a partial basement, a fireplace, and a 942 square foot garage. The property has a 16,740 square foot site and is located in Deerfield, West Deerfield Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with regard to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on three equity comparables located within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with 2-story homes of brick or wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 4,059 to 4,668 square feet of living area. The dwellings range in age from 78 to 120 years old. Two homes have a partial basement and one home has a concrete slab

foundation. Each home has central air conditioning, two or five fireplaces, and a garage ranging in size from 528 to 910 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$154,783 to \$211,982 or from \$38.13 to \$45.41 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment to \$124,323 or \$41.17 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$227,763. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$151,000 or \$50.00 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five equity comparables located within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with 1-story, 1.75-story, or 2-story homes of brick, wood siding, or brick and wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 2,587 to 3,094 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1924 to 1939 with the two oldest homes having effective ages of 1943 and 1964. Each home has a partial or full basement, three of which have finished area, one or two fireplaces, and a garage ranging in size from 243 to 400 square feet of building area. Four homes have central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$131,529 to \$191,346 or from \$50.84 to \$66.30 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's improvement assessment.

## **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains a total of eight equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables, due to significant differences from the subject in dwelling size and/or foundation type. The Board gives less weight to the board of review's comparables #3, #4, and #5, due to substantial differences from the subject in design and/or basement finish.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to the board of review's comparables #1 and #2, which are relatively similar to the subject in dwelling size, year built, location, and some features. The subject is a larger home and has a much larger garage than these comparables, but one of these comparables has a newer effective age than the subject, suggesting adjustments to these comparables would be needed to make them more similar to the subject. These most similar comparables have improvement assessments of \$131,529 and \$191,346 or \$50.84 and \$66.30 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$151,000 or \$50.00 per square foot of living area is bracketed by the best comparables in terms of total

improvement assessment and is below the best comparables on a per square foot basis. Based on this record and after considering appropriate adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

#### **IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
