



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Shirley Drelich

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Shirley Drelich, the appellant, by attorney Andrew J. Rukavina, of The Tax Appeal Company in Mundelein; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$45,755
IMPR.: \$232,966
TOTAL: \$278,721

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2020 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 4,465 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1998. Features of the home include a full basement, central air conditioning, two fireplaces, and a 780 square foot garage. The property has an approximately 9,890 square foot site and is located in Highland Park, Moraine Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on three comparable sales presented in two grid analyses. The comparables are located from 0.05 to .40 of a mile from the subject and one comparable is within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables have 9,240 or 19,020 square foot sites improved with 2-story homes of wood siding or brick and aluminum siding exterior construction ranging in size from 2,308 to 5,820 square feet of living area. The

dwellings were built in 1979 or 2000. Each home has a full basement, two of which have finished area, central air conditioning, and a garage ranging in size from 440 to 816 square feet of building area. Two homes each have a fireplace. The comparables sold from July 2019 to January 2020 for prices ranging from \$411,000 to \$930,000 or from \$159.79 to \$184.14 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment to \$248,839 which would reflect a market value of \$746,592 or \$167.21 per square foot of living area, land included, when applying the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$278,721. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$837,251 or \$187.51 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2020 three year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.29% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales, together with listing sheets for these comparables. The comparables are located from 0.04 to 0.40 of a mile from the subject and three comparables are within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The parcels range in size from 9,250 to 13,710 square feet of land area and are improved with 1-story or 2-story homes of dryvit, stucco, wood siding, or brick and wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 3,132 to 4,524 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1996 to 1999 with the oldest home having an effective age of 2004. Each home has a partial or full basement with finished area,¹ central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces, and a garage ranging in size from 441 to 736 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from September 2020 to May 2021 for prices ranging from \$765,000 to \$830,000 or from \$169.10 to \$261.81 per square foot of living area, including land. The board of review noted that there were few sales of comparable properties in the subject's neighborhood. Based on this evidence the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains a total of seven comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #1 and #3, which are substantially smaller and older homes than the subject dwelling. The Board gives less weight to the board of review's comparable #2, which is a 1-story home compared to the subject 2-story home.

¹ Although the board of review reported that comparable #5 has a crawl space foundation, the board of review also reported that this property has finished basement area, indicating that this property has a partial basement.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appellant's comparable #2 and the board of review's comparables #1, #3, and #4, which have varying degrees of similarity to the subject, although adjustments to these comparables would be needed for differences from the subject, such as dwelling size and basement finish, to make these properties more similar to the subject. These most similar comparables sold from November 2019 to May 2021 for prices ranging from \$765,000 to \$930,000 or from \$159.79 to \$261.81 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$837,251 or \$187.51 per square foot of living area, including land, which is within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. Based on this evidence and after considering appropriate adjustments to the best comparable for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
